

THE 1960 TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP OF THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL

It was a happy turn of events that took the 1960 World Amateur Team Championship to the Merion Golf Club, in the suburbs of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in the United States. Merion supplied in abundant measure the two main necessities for such an occasion as the second playing for the Eisenhower Trophy — first, a warmth of hospitality and, second, a great golf course.

The spirit of the meeting is reflected in a few examples such as the following:

countries, 71 came to know Americans better as guests in the homes of members of Merion and other clubs. Private housing was provided for all players who requested it, as well as for a number of players' wives and officials.

... Every competitor played with eight others from eight different countries, with a few exceptions.

... Merion ladies furnished private transportation, from early morning until night. All players were provided free caddie service and lunches, with breakfast for early starters, thanks to a Hospitality Fund of more than \$18,000 contributed by eight American


business firms and more than 250 Member Clubs of the United States Golf Association. (Amateur status rules permit acceptance of expenses in such international events.)

... The Pine Valley Golf Club invited all players for a day of informal fun over its world-famous course after the Championship.

Thus the atmosphere was warm, friendly and ideal for sowing seeds of good will and peace. Although good will and peace cannot be measured in the way that a golf score can be measured, they were present in full supply throughout that week ending October 1, 1960. The events at Merion will not change the course of world history. But the spirit of Merion is the same quiet force that has always brought man closer to man. That was the meaning of Merion.

Fantastic Scoring by Americans

The second main ingredient for a fine Championship—that is, a great golf course—was provided completely by the Merion East Course. Merion has entertained many championships, and all the great golfers who have played it have a wholesome regard for its requirements in golfing tactics.

Ben Hogan, in the midst of winning the 1950 United States Open Championship, remarked that no other course had kept him "so constantly on the defensive." Merion is by no means the longest of courses, measuring 6,694 yards, but it requires placement of shots from start to finish. Yet it is eminently fair - the lowest score ever made there was a 64 by Lee Mackey, Jr., a professional. in the 1950 United States Open; however, the lowest 72-hole score was 287 — seven above par — by Ben Hogan, Lloyd Mangrum and George Fazio in tying in 1950.

Viewed against this background, the scoring of the United States team was fantastic in the second World Amateur Championship. The Americans' winning total was 834, 42 strokes better than Australia's second-place 876; Great Britain and Ireland was third with 881. This was in marked contrast to the first World Championship at St. Andrews in 1958; that event was notable for its closeness of competition,

Australia winning in a play-off of a tie with the United States.

Merion's par is 70. It was broken eight times, all by the Americans; half of their 16 rounds were sub-par.

A team's score consists of the best three individual scores in each round. All of the Americans contributed to their team's victory — Deane Beman, aged 22; Robert W. Gardner, 39; William Hyndman, III, 44; Jack Nicklaus, 20. Their non-playing Captain was Totton P. Heffelfinger.

It was a miraculous coincidence that the United States players happened to be at their peak simultaneously. There is no other way to account for the fact that all four finished among the five lowest

scorers in a field that included the best amateur golfers in the world, among them being Joseph B. Carr, three-time British Champion; Bruce Devlin, of Australia; Robert Charles, of New Zealand, and Henri de Lamaze, of France.

There is no official competition for individual low score; the World Amateur Golf Council feels that the Championship should be strictly a team event, and that no man can serve two masters—his team and himself. It is not difficult to imagine a player confronted with a situation where he should play safely for the sake of his team but boldly for his personal glory.

Even so, the status of the individual leaders should be recorded: Nicklaus 269, Beman 282, Devlin of Australia 288, Gardner 289, Hyndman 289.


Nicklaus' four rounds of 66-67-68-68 constituted one of the greatest scoring performances in golf history. Although Merion's fairways were wider, the rough shorter and the greens softer than for the American Open,

the course was a hard test. It was very wet and slow the first two days, play was tiresomely slow, and there was a strong wind the last day. Nicklaus was magnificent. In the first round he had a putt at a 64 but three-putted.

In the third round Deane Beman, the American Amateur Champion, broke par with a 69 but, ironically, did not make his team that day, his fellow-players all outscoring him.





Meeting of World Council

The Biennial Meeting of the World Amateur Golf Council was held at the Philadelphia Country Club on September 27, 1960. Among the actions were:

- 1. Abandonment of a proposal to establish zonal competitions for countries given geographical zones, using Championship scores, concurrent with the Championship.
- 2. Defeat of a proposal to award prizes to the individuals returning the three lowest scores for 72 holes, starting in 1962.
- 3. An appeal to the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and the United States Golf Association for uniformity in the Rules of Golf and the Rules of Amateur Status.
- 4. Acceptance of Japan's invitation to entertain the 1962 Championship, October 10-13.

Delegates and Duffers Cup

Prior to the Championship a 36hole handicap competition for the Delegates and Duffers Cup was held at the Gulph Mills Golf Club.

Winner was Hord W. Hardin, St. Louis, Mo., member of the USGA Executive Committee, with a net score of 148. Low scorer in the Guest Division was Eugene G. Grace, Jr., of Philadelphia, with 144.

The Delegates and Duffers Cup originated from a suggestion by former President Eisenhower of the United States. The participants were non-playing captains, delegates to the meeting of the World Amateur Golf Council, and officials of the USGA.

ARTICLES OF THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL

Adopted May 2, 1958. Amended October 7, 1958.

ARTICLE I

The name of this council is THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

Section 1. Friendship and Sportsmanship through Golf. The object of the Council is to foster friendship and sportsmanship among the peoples of the world through the conduct biennially of an Amateur Team Championship for The Eisenhower Trophy.

Section 2. Rules of Golf. The Championship shall be conducted in accordance with the Rules of Golf as approved by The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, and The United States Golf Association.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Eligibility. Membership in the Council is open to any organization which:

- (a) Constitutes the sole central authority for amateur golf in its country; and
- (b) Has adopted and administers the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association.

Section 2. Election. An application for membership shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such other data as the Administrative Committee determines.

An applicant may be elected to Membership by the Council after determination by the Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

Section 3. Finances, (a) The expenses of the Council shall be limited to the following:

- (1) Insurance and maintenance of the Championship Trophy:
 - (2) Provision of prizes for individuals;

(3) Cost of stationery, postage, printing and other communications incurred by the Secretary of the Council.

All such expenses shall be shared equally by the Member Organizations and shall be payable annually in November to the Secretary. Each such payment shall be in the currency of the Secretary's country, unless prohibited by law or government regulation.

The income of the Council shall be limited to reimbursement of or other provision for the foregoing expenses.

No Member Organization may incur any expense for the Council, and no representative of the Council shall have authority to incur any expense except as expressly stated herein.

- (b) Any other expense incident to the affairs of the Council shall be borne by the Member Organization whose representative incurs such expense.
- (c) The expense of conducting the Championship shall be borne by the Member Organization entertaining it.

Section 4. Obligations and Discipline. The acceptance of membership in the Council shall bind each Member Organization to uphold all the provisions of these Articles and any rules or actions of the Council or the Administrative Committee.

Any Member Organization failing in these obligations or ceasing to meet the eligibility requirements may be suspended or expelled by the Council.

Section 5. Withdrawal. Any Member Organization may withdraw from membership by notifying the Secretary to that effect.

Any Member Organization so withdrawing shall remain obligated for its share of the Council's expenses for the year in which withdrawal occurred.

ARTICLE IV

Section 1. Time. The Championship shall be held biennially, starting in 1958, on such dates as the Council shall determine. Normally, the Championship shall be held in the second or the third week of October.

Section 2. Place. (a) The Championship shall be rotated among the three following zones in the order stated:

- (1) European-African Zone Countries of Europe, Africa and the Middle East.
- (2) American Zone Countries of North America, Caribbean America and South America.
- (3) Australasian Zone Countries of Asia, Australia, New Zealand and Oceania.
- (b) The location of each Championship will be determined by the Council at its Biennial Meeting immediately preceding.

Invitations to entertain the Championship shall be submitted by Member Organizations to the Secretary at least three months in advance of the Biennial Meeting. The Secretary shall inform all Member Organizations of such invitations at least one month in advance of the Meeting.

ARTICLE V

AMATEUR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

Section 1. Entry Dates. Each Member Organization shall inform the Secretary biennially as to whether or not it will enter the Championship; such notification shall reach the Secretary not later than three months before the Championship. Later entries may be accepted if the Member Organization entertaining the Championship approves.

Each Member Organization which enters the Championship shall inform the Secretary of the personnel of its Team not later than one month before the Championship. Substitutions may be made at any subsequent time at the pleasure of the Member Organization.

Section 2. Qualification of Players; Amateur Status. The players comprising each Team shall be:

- (a) Amateur golfers under the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews or The United States Golf Association; and
- (b) Citizens of the country of the Member Organization represented, except that in cases where a Team of citizens would be impracticable, players normally resident in the country may be included.

Each Team shall have a captain, who may be either a player or a non-player.

Section 3. Form of Play. (a) Each Team shall consist of three or four players.

(b) The Championship shall consist of 72 holes stroke play: 18 holes each on four consecutive days of the Championship period. All the players of each Team shall be eligible for all four rounds; disqualification of a player under the Rules of Golf in any round shall not be effective for any subsequent round unless the Administrative Committee determines otherwise.

In each 18-hole round, the total of the three lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

The total of the three-player Team Scores for the four rounds shall be the Team's score for the Championship.

The Champion shall be the Team with the lowest such total score for 72 holes.

- (c) If a tie for the Championship occurs, the Teams concerned shall play off at 18 holes stroke play, the exact day to be determined in advance by the Member Organization entertaining the Championship. The Team with the lowest total score by three players shall win the play-off. Should an 18-hole play-off result in a further tie, the Teams so tied shall immediately continue to play off hole by hole until the winner is determined; the total of the three lowest scores will be the Team score for each hole.
- (d) Any tie for second or third place shall be determined by a hole-by-hole play-off immediately after conclusion of the Championship proper and on the day of the fourth round; the total of the three lowest scores will be the Team score for each hole.
- Section 4. Prizes. (a) The Eisenhower Trophy, presented to the Council by friends of golf in the United States through The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.
- (b) Miniature replicas of The Eisenhower Trophy shall be awarded for the permanent possession of the Member Organizations whose teams finish first, second and third in each Championship.
- (c) A uniform type of prize for individuals shall be awarded to the players

and the Captain of the winning Team, the second-place Team and the third-place Team.

(d) No other prizes may be accepted from any source, except symbolic gifts by a Member Organization to its Team.

ARTICLE VI

CONDUCT OF CHAMPIONSHIP

The Member Organization entertaining the Championship shall have the honor of and be responsible for planning and conducting the Championship, subject to the applicable provisions of these Articles and approval by the Administrative Committee, and for all the expenses in connection therewith except the expenses of the Teams. Such Member Organization may charge admission to spectators and otherwise raise income as it may desire, and any excess of the proceeds over the expenses shall be disposed of as the Council may determine.

No financial liability shall attach to either the Council or to any Member Organization other than the Member Organization entertaining the Championship.

ARTICLE VII

EXPENSES OF TEAMS

Each Member Organization shall be responsible for the expenses of its Team's players and captain.

ARTICLE VIII

COUNCIL MEETINGS

Section 1. Biennial Meeting. The Council shall meet biennially on the day before the start of the Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting of the Council each Member Organization shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization, and who shall be present at the Meeting in person. Appointment of Delegates shall be certified to the Secretary in advance.

Section 2. Quorum. Ten Member Organizations represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting of the Council.

Section 3. Action Without Meeting. Between Biennial Meetings, the Council may

take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the Member Organizations by the Secretary pursuant to direction of the Administrative Committee.

Section 4. Majority Decision. A majority vote of the Delegates at a Biennial Meeting of the Council at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the Member Organizations in cases of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Council, subject to any additional requirements of other provisions of these Articles.

ARTICLE IX

Administrative Committee

Section 1. Composition. There shall be an Administrative Committee of nine persons representing seven Member Organizations; at least one Member Organization in each of the three respective Zones shall be represented. Each such person shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization he represents.

Section 2. Election. (a) At each Biennial Meeting five Member Organizations shall be chosen, by ballot, to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years. The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association shall each be permanently entitled to appoint two representatives.

- (b) Each Member Organization so chosen shall promptly appoint its representative to the Administrative Committee and give the Secretary notification of the appointment. If a Delegate of any Member Organization so chosen is present at the Biennial Meeting, he shall thereupon become the appointee of his Member Organization to the Administrative Committee.
- (c) A Member Organization shall have the right to change its appointee to the Administrative Committee at its pleasure; any such change shall become effective when the Secretary receives notification thereof.

Section 3. Duties. The Administrative Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Council, subject to the provisions of these Articles and to directions of the Council.

Section 4. Meetings. The retiring Administrative Committee shall meet immediately prior to the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

The Administrative Committee newly determined at the Biennial Meeting of the Council shall meet immediately after the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

Section 5. Quorum. Three members present in person representing at least three Member Organizations shall constitute a quorum of the Administrative Committee.

Section 6. Action between Meetings. Between meetings, the Administrative Committee may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the representatives to the Administrative Committee by the Secretary.

Section 7. Majority Decision. A majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the entire Administrative Committee in case of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Administrative Committee.

ARTICLE X

OFFICERS

Section 1. Titles; Election. (a) The officers of the Council shall be a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, and the Chairman and the Vice-Chairman shall each be one of the representatives to the Administrative Committee, provided, however, that until at least the Biennial Meeting in 1962, there shall instead be two Joint Chairmen, who shall be representatives of The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, At each Biennial Meeting the Council shall determine by ballot the Member Organizations whose representatives to the Administrative Committee shall hold such respective offices for the ensuing two years. If either Member Organization concerned changes its representative to the Administrative Committee during such period, the successor shall assume the office concerned.

(b) The Secretary shall be appointed by the Administrative Committee.

Section 2. Chairman. The Chairman shall preside at meetings of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, and in general shall perform the customary duties of his office.

Section 3. Vice-Chairman. During the absence or inability of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall perform the duties of the Chairman.

Section 4. Secretary. The Secretary shall keep the records of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, give notices of all meetings and conduct all votes by mail, carry on the correspondence of the Council, and perform all other customary duties of his office.

ARTICLE XI

LANGUAGE

The official language of the Council is English.

ARTICLE XII

CARE OF TROPHY

Section 1. Protection. The United States Golf Association shall retain title to the Championship Trophy, and shall make arrangements for its insurance and for its safekeeping during any suspension of the Championship.

Section 2. Dissolution of Council. In the event of dissolution of the Council, such use or other disposition of the Champion-ship Trophy shall be made as The United States Golf Association may in its discretion determine.

ARTICLE XIII

AMENDMENTS

These Articles may be amended by action of the Council; provided, however, that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the Rules of Golf and the Rules of Amateur Status shall not be amended without the unanimous affirmative vote of the Member Organizations; that the provisions of these Articles with respect to permanent representation to the Administrative Committee and those with respect to the Joint Chairmen until the 1962 meeting shall not be amended withou; the affirmative votes of the respective Member Organizations concerned; and that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the ownership and custody of the Championship Trophy shall not be amended without the affirmative vote of The United States Golf Association; and provided further, that any amendment of these Articles increasing the monetary obligations of Member Organizations shall not be binding upon any Member Organization which voted against the amendment.
