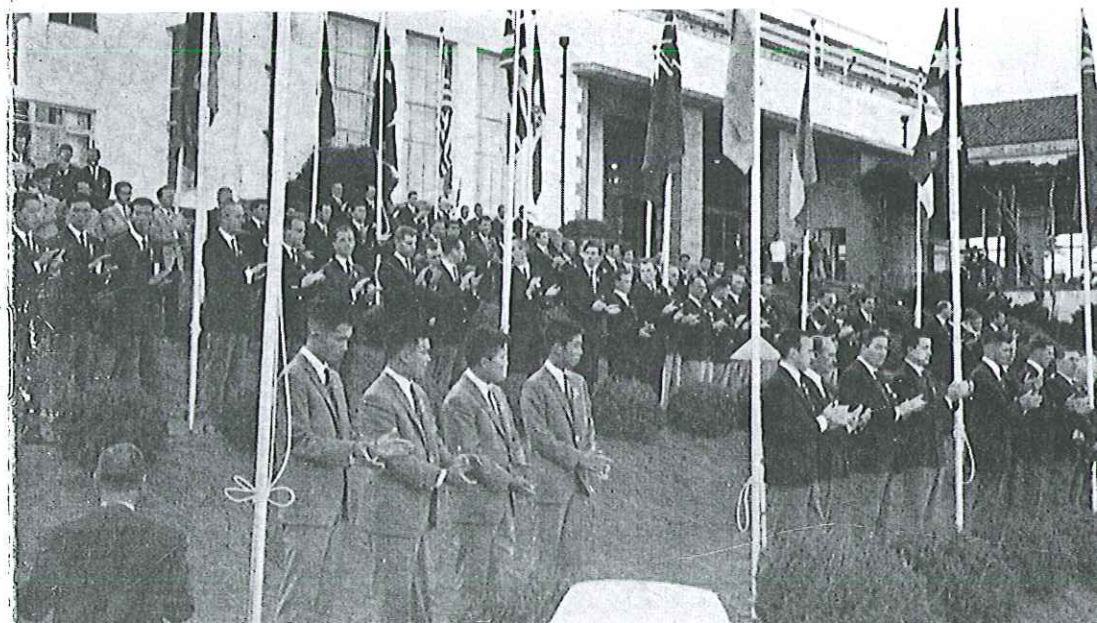


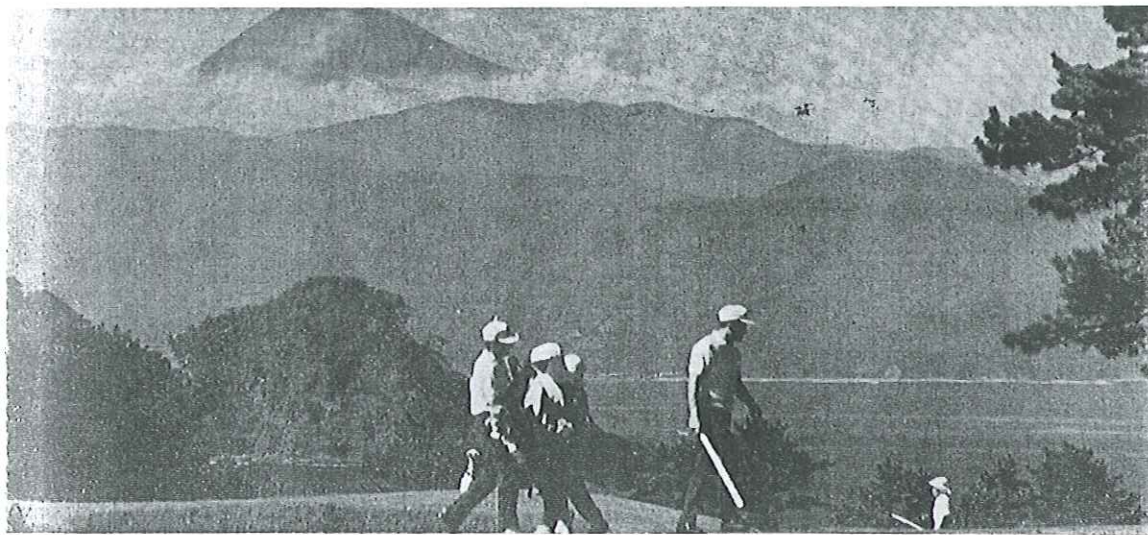

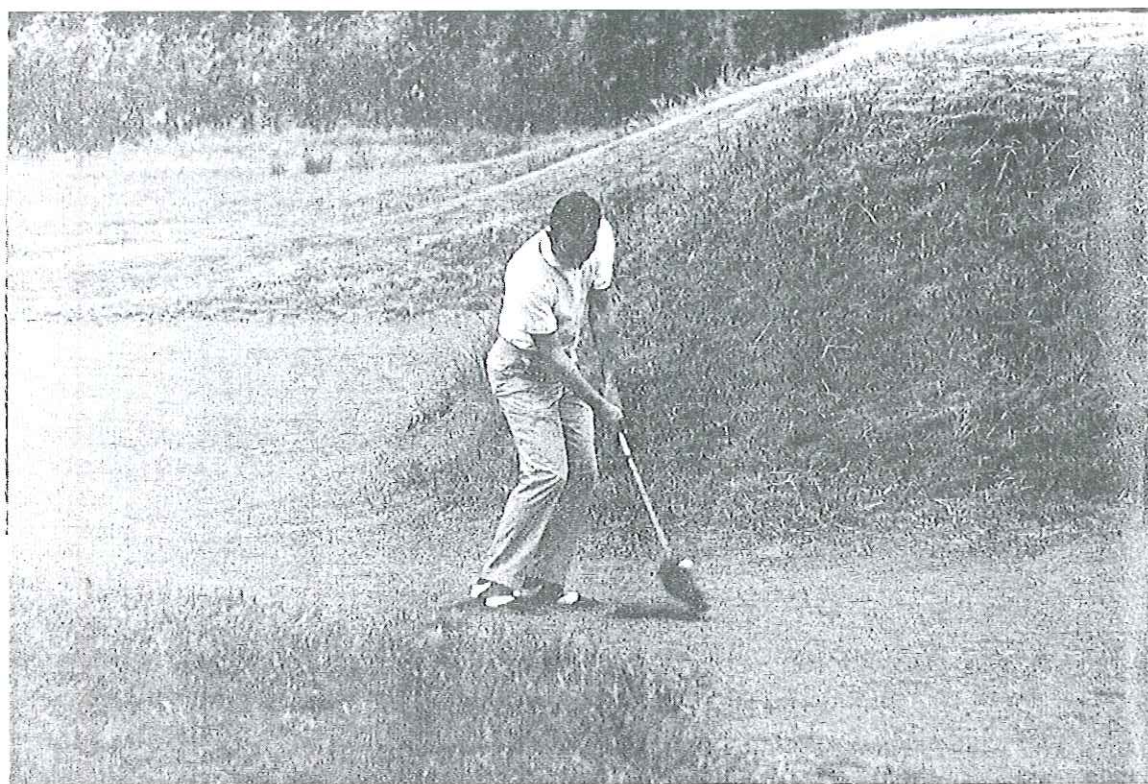

The Eisenhower Trophy had just been presented to the United States team. Now the amateur golfers of 23 countries, lined up alongside flagpoles flying their national colors, were about to break ranks on the terrace of a lovely, secluded Japanese resort overlooking the vast Pacific.

This was the end of the third World Team Championship.

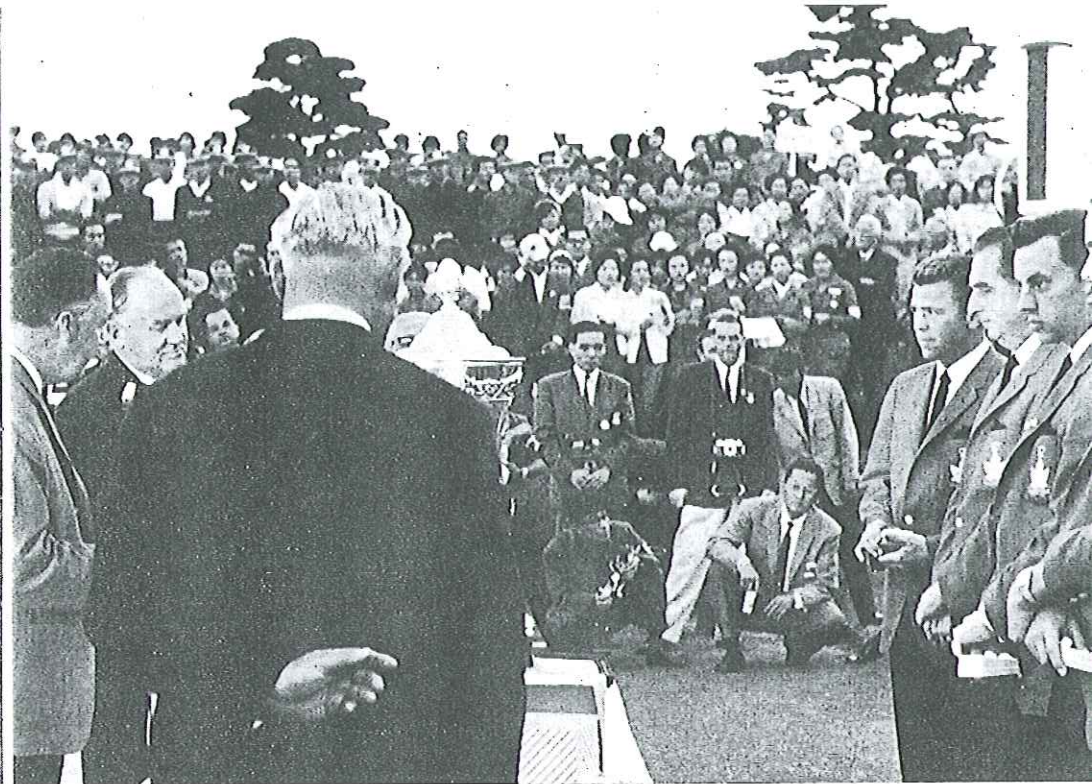
But unexpectedly from the handsome hotel behind the terrace came

the moving strains of "Auld Lang Syne." Spontaneously, those who knew the words started to sing, and soon everybody was joining in. An Australian player, Tom Crow, crossed his arms and clasped the hands of the men on each side of him, and before the singing had reached the second "should auld acquaintance be forgot," everybody was united in a double, arm-crossed handclasp. You could have easily counted the dry eyes.

This, then, was the true if unscheduled ending of the 1962 World Championship—an ending which confirmed the renewal of old friendships and the start of new ones—an ending, and yet a beginning—values far deeper than those of golf competition. For this is what the World Amateur Golf Team Championship is all about.

Japan contributed generously to the development of that spirit, with boundless hospitality and a remarkably fine home for the event. The Kawana Hotel near Ito, some 75 miles southwest of Tokyo, is a golfer's Shangri-La. It has two golf courses, in a spectacularly beautiful location on high bluffs bordering the ocean. The fact that all the players were under one roof gave a special flavor to the

tournament and a special opportunity for people to know one another.

Kawana's Fuji Course is a Championship test by any standard. It was played at 6,587 yards with a par of 70. Fuji has some steep hills and odd bounces to accentuate the problems of its excellent golfing design. Nothing was spared to keep it in excellent order.

The turf cover is "Korai" (Korean) grass, or zoysia, with a fine-bladed hybridized type used on the putting greens. Zoysia is a stiffish grass which affords marvelous lies in the fairway. On the putting green, it demands a truly made stroke, else errors are accentuated. Although this was their first experience with zoysia for nearly all the players, most of them learned to deal with it effectively. There were

13-sub-par scores in the 368 rounds played by 92 competitors; six were made in the final round. Three players scored 66.

The United States won the Championship for the second successive time with a team composed of Deane R. Beman, Labron Harris, Jr., the American Amateur Champion; William J. Patton and Richard H. Sikes, 22-year-old college student. Their non-playing Captain was John D. Ames, one of the original organizers of the World Amateur Golf Council and a first Joint Chairman.

The competition is 72 holes stroke play. Each team's four players play all four rounds; the team's score consists of the best three individual scores in each round.

Going into the last round, the United States led Canada by merely two strokes, which is really no lead at all in this style of play. The experienced Patton was America's first player in the climactic round, but he came a cropper and finished with 81.

For the other Americans, this meant that each needed to keep the ball rolling, with little or no margin for error. Here is what those young men did when they had to do it: Beman, 66; Harris, 70; Sikes, 69;—a total of 205, tying the second-best single-round score since the Championship was inaugurated.

The United States' winning score was 854. Canada was second with 862, followed by Great Britain and Ireland, 874; New Zealand, 882; and Mexico 887. One of the great surprises was the fine play by the Republic of China team; their 892 won sixth place by a stroke over Australia, which had been runner-up to the United States in 1960 and winner of the first Championship in 1958. Then came South Africa, 896. Japan made a splendid showing to be ninth with 902.

Canada duelled with the United States from the outset. After the first round, the USA led with 212, to Canada's second-place 215. The lead shifted during a rainy second round; when it ended Canada was ahead, 432 to 438, with New Zealand holding a close third position.

The Americans rebounded strongly, wiped out Canada's six-stroke lead, and went ahead by two at the 54-hole point, 649 to 651. They were not to be denied in the stretch run.

In the two previous World Championships Canada finished sixth. This time Gary Cowan set a pace that made his side a leader from the start. Cowan played marvelous golf and returned the lowest individual total, 72-68-71-69—280, level with Kawana's exacting par. His teammates were Bill Wakeham, Nick Weslock, and Bob Wylie, under the captaincy of Dr. Jack E. Leddy, President of the Royal Canadian Golf Association.

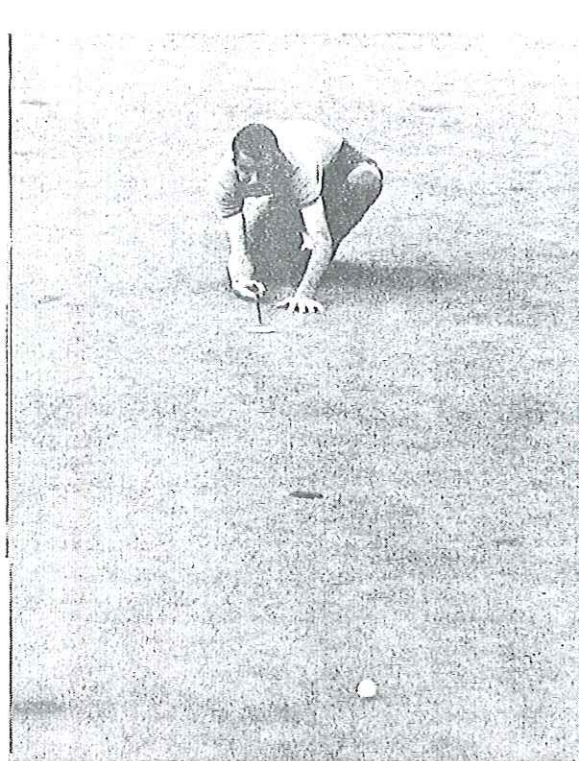
Sikes, USA, had second best score of 283 with three 69s and a 76.

The loving care given to the golf course was characteristic of the cease-

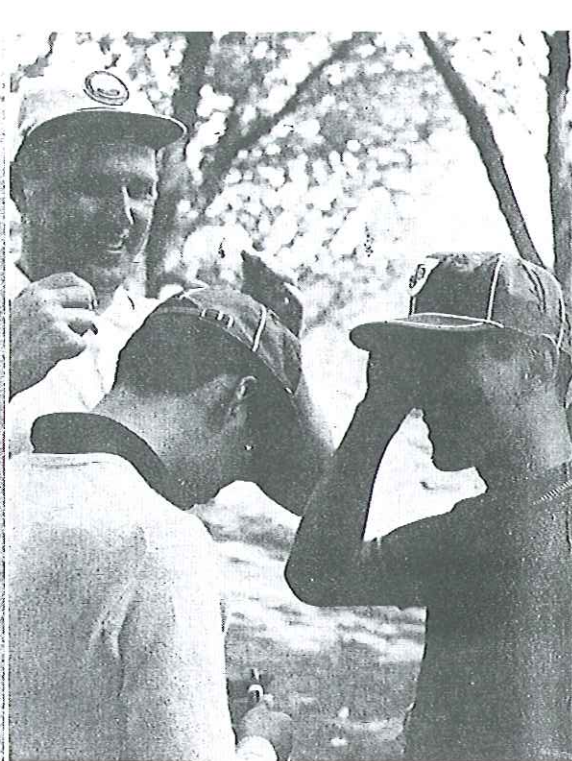
less work by the Japan Golf Association in its efforts to conduct a superlative Championship, under Mitsujiro Ishii and Shun Nomura, President and Vice-President, respectively.

The guiding spirit was Shun Nomura, who had a dream fulfilled in having the Championship in his country. Five years earlier he suggested a team match between high-handicappers of Japan and the United States. Although this never came about, it led to the creation of the World Council.

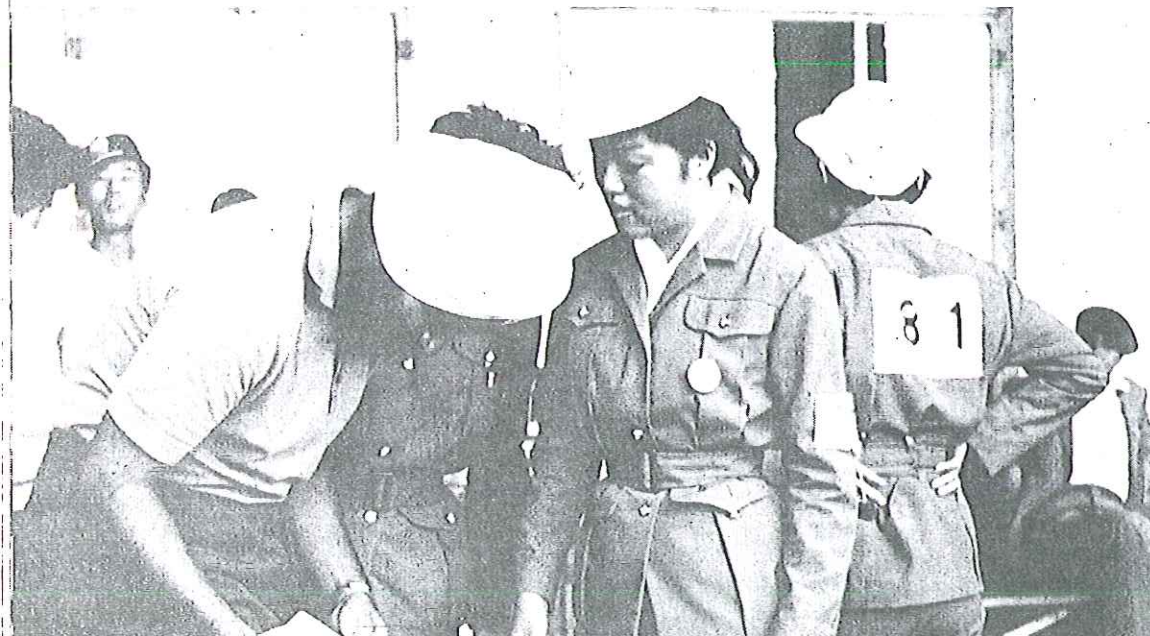
One of the best contributions to the events at Kawana was made by the girls and young ladies who served as caddies. They were completely capable and charming in their blue trousered uniforms, white caps and veils, gloves and sneakers. The players were unanimous in their appreciation—and the Japanese girls were appreciative of their players, for many a golfer went home from Kawana with woolen club-head covers for his woods, newly knitted on the spot by his admiring caddie. Nothing was more expressive of the spirit of Kawana.



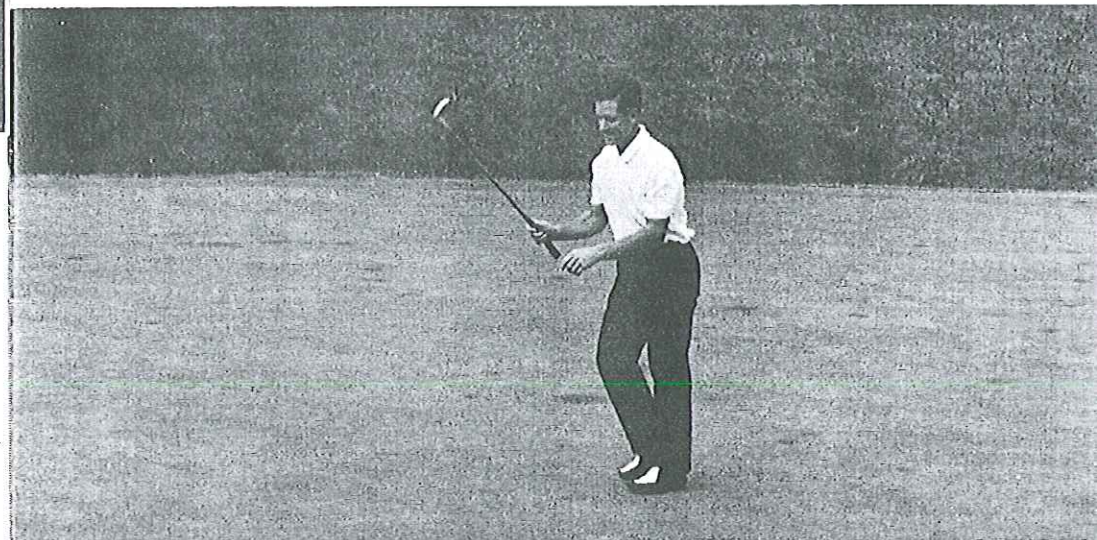
Lining Up. Richard H. Sikes, United States, whose 283 was second best score.

1964 CHAMPIONSHIP IN ROME

The 1964 World Amateur Team Championship will be played at the Olgiata Golf Club, Rome, Italy, it was decided at the biennial meeting of the World Amateur Golf Council on October 9, 1962 at the Kawana Hotel, Kawana, Japan. The dates are to be October 7-10.

The Delegates decided to continue the Joint Chairmanship of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and the United States Golf Association. Henry Turcan represented the R and A as Joint Chairman at Kawana and Clarence W. Benedict represented the USGA, in substitution for John M. Winters, Jr., USGA President. Joseph C. Dey, Jr., of the USGA, was re-elected Secretary.

In the Administrative Committee of the Council, Peru replaced Argentina, and India replaced New Zealand. Re-elected to the Committee were Italy, Japan, and Australia.

He scored 73-72—145, deducted 14 handicap strokes, and his net 131 took a one-year lease on the trophy. Second was Shigeso Inoue, of Japan, with 76-73—149—12—137.

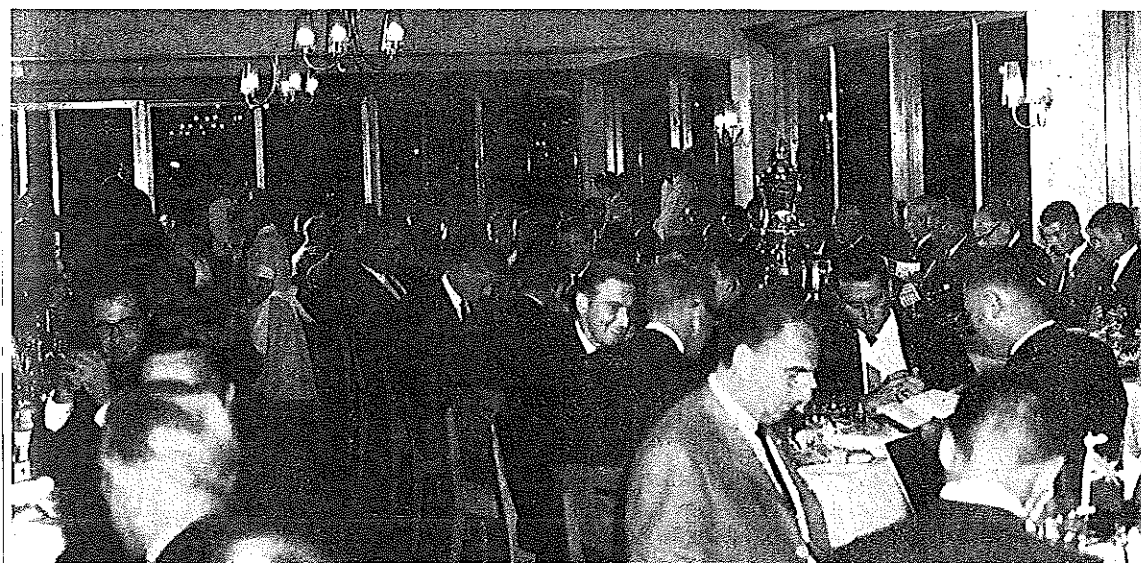

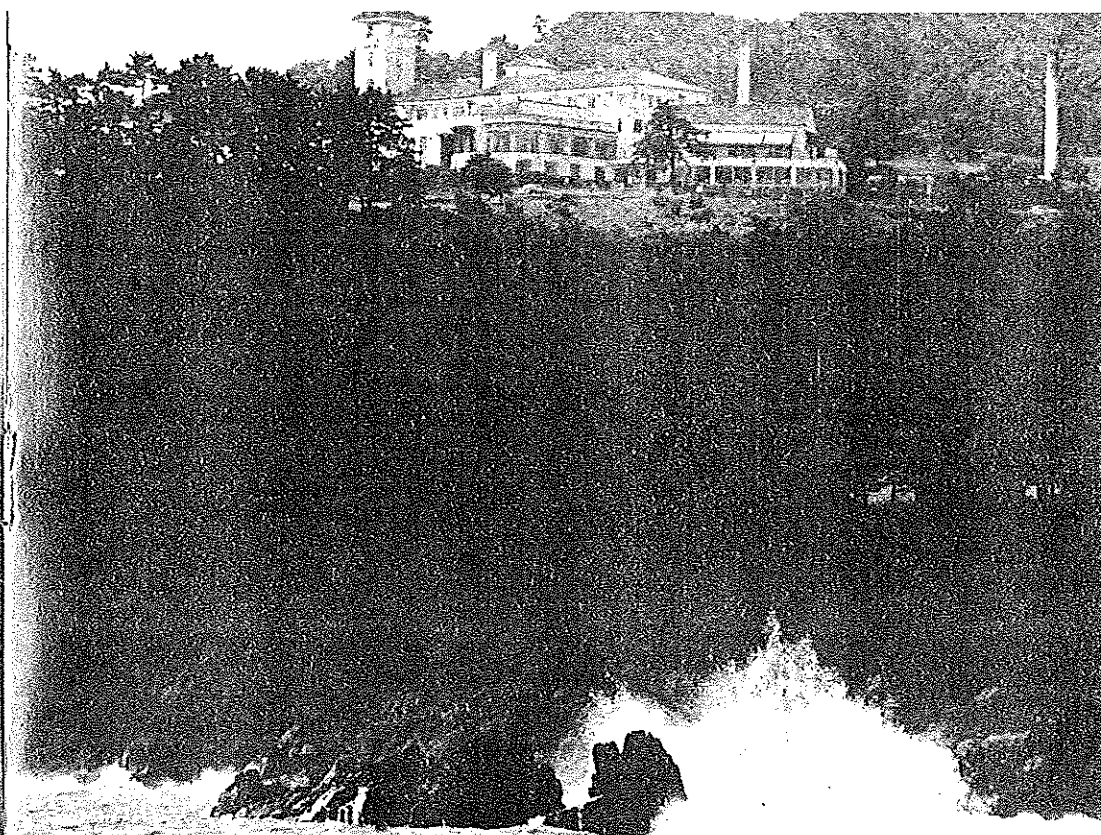

ARTICLES OF THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL

Adopted May, 2, 1958. Amended October 7, 1958.

ARTICLE I

The name of this council is THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

SECTION 1. FRIENDSHIP AND SPORTSMANSHIP THROUGH GOLF. The object of the Council is to foster friendship and sportsmanship among the peoples of the world through the conduct biennially of an Amateur Team Championship for The Eisenhower Trophy.

SECTION 2. RULES OF GOLF. The Championship shall be conducted in accordance with the Rules of Golf as approved by The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, and The United States Golf Association.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. ELIGIBILITY. Membership in the Council is open to any organization which:

(a) Constitutes the sole central authority for amateur golf in its country; and

(b) Has adopted and administers the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association.

SECTION 2. ELECTION. An application for membership shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such other data as the Administrative Committee determines.

An applicant may be elected to Membership by the Council after determination by the Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

SECTION 3. FINANCES (a) The expenses of the Council shall be limited to the following:

(1) Insurance and maintenance of the Championship Trophy;

(2) Provision of prizes for individuals;

(3) Cost of stationery, postage, printing and other communications incurred by the Secretary of the Council.

All such expenses shall be shared equally by the Member Organizations and shall be payable annually in November to the Secretary. Each such payment shall be in the currency of the Secretary's country, unless prohibited by law or government regulation.

The income of the Council shall be limited to reimbursement of or other provision for the foregoing expenses.

No Member Organization may incur any expense for the Council, and no representative of the Council shall have authority to incur any expense except as expressly stated herein.

(b) Any other expense incident to the affairs of the Council shall be borne by the Member Organization whose representative incurs such expense.

(c) The expense of conducting the Championship shall be borne by the Member Organization entertaining it.

SECTION 4. OBLIGATIONS AND DISCIPLINE. The acceptance of membership in the Council shall bind each Member Organization to uphold all the provisions of these Articles and any rules or actions of the Council or the Administrative Committee.

Any Member Organization failing in these obligations or ceasing to meet the eligibility requirements may be suspended or expelled by the Council.

SECTION 5. WITHDRAWAL. Any Member Organization may withdraw from membership by notifying the Secretary to that effect.

Any Member Organization so withdrawing shall remain obligated for its share of the Council's expenses for the year in which withdrawal occurred.

ARTICLE IV

CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. TIME. The Championship shall be held biennially, starting in 1958, on such dates as the Council shall deter-

mine. Normally, the Championship shall be held in the second or the third week of October.

SECTION 2. PLACE. (a) The Championship shall be rotated among the three following zones in the order stated:

(1) *European-African Zone*—Countries of Europe, Africa and the Middle East.

(2) *American Zone*—Countries of North America, Caribbean America and South America.

(3) *Australasian Zone*—Countries of Asia, Australia, New Zealand and Oceania.

(b) The location of each Championship will be determined by the Council at its Biennial Meeting immediately preceding.

Invitations to entertain the Championship shall be submitted by Member Organizations to the Secretary at least three months in advance of the Biennial Meeting. The Secretary shall inform all Member Organizations of such invitations at least one month in advance of the Meeting.

ARTICLE V

AMATEUR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. ENTRY DATES. Each Member Organization shall inform the Secretary biennially as to whether or not it will enter the Championship; such notification shall reach the Secretary not later than three months before the Championship. Later entries may be accepted if the Member Organization entertaining the Championship approves.

Each Member Organization which enters the Championship shall inform the Secretary of the personnel of its Team not later than one month before the Championship. Substitutions may be made at any subsequent time at the pleasure of the Member Organization.

SECTION 2. QUALIFICATION OF PLAYERS; AMATEUR STATUS. The players comprising each Team shall be:

(a) Amateur golfers under the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews or The United States Golf Association; and

(b) Citizens of the country of the Member Organization represented, except that in cases where a Team of citizens would be impracticable, players normally resident in the country may be included.

Each Team shall have a captain, who may be either a player or a non-player.

SECTION 3. FORM OF PLAY. (a) Each Team shall consist of three or four players.

(b) The Championship shall consist of 72 holes stroke play: 18 holes each on four consecutive days of the Championship period. All the players of each Team shall be eligible for all four rounds; disqualification of a player under the Rules of Golf in any round shall not be effective for any subsequent round unless the Administrative Committee determines otherwise.

In each 18-hole round, the total of the three lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

The total of the three-player Team Scores for the four rounds shall be the Team's score for the Championship.

The Champion shall be the Team with the lowest such total score for 72 holes.

(c) If a tie for the Championship occurs, the Teams concerned shall play off at 18 holes stroke play, the exact day to be determined in advance by the Member Organization entertaining the Championship. The Team with the lowest total score by three players shall win the play-off. Should an 18-hole play-off result in a further tie, the Teams so tied shall immediately continue to play off hole by hole until the winner is determined; the total of the three lowest scores will be the Team score for each hole.

(d) Any tie for second or third place shall be determined by a hole-by-hole play-off immediately after conclusion of the Championship proper and on the day of the fourth round; the total of the three lowest scores will be the Team score for each hole.

SECTION 4. PRIZES. (a) The Eisenhower Trophy, presented to the Council by friends of golf in the United States through The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

(b) Miniature replicas of The Eisenhower Trophy shall be awarded for the permanent possession of the Member Organizations whose teams finish first, second and third in each Championship.

(c) A uniform type of prize for individuals shall be awarded to the players and the Captain of the winning Team, the second-place Team and the third-place Team.

(d) No other prizes may be accepted from any source, except symbolic gifts by a Member Organization to its Team.

ARTICLE VI

CONDUCT OF CHAMPIONSHIP

The Member Organization entertaining the Championship shall have the honor of and be responsible for planning and conducting the Championship, subject to the applicable provisions of these Articles and approval by the Administrative Committee, and for all the expenses in connection therewith except the expenses of the Teams. Such Member Organization may charge admission to spectators and otherwise raise income as it may desire, and any excess of the proceeds over the expenses shall be disposed of as the Council may determine.

No financial liability shall attach to either the Council or to any Member Organization other than the Member Organization entertaining the Championship.

ARTICLE VII

EXPENSES OF TEAMS

Each Member Organization shall be responsible for the expenses of its Team's players and captain.

ARTICLE VIII

COUNCIL MEETINGS

SECTION 1. BIENNIAL MEETING. The Council shall meet biennially on the day before the start of the Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting of the Council each Member Organization shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization, and who shall be present at the Meeting in person. Appointment of Delegates shall be certified to the Secretary in advance.

SECTION 2. QUORUM. Ten Member Organizations represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting of the Council.

SECTION 3. ACTION WITHOUT MEETING. Between Biennial Meetings, the Council may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the Member Organizations by the Secretary pursuant to direction of the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 4. MAJORITY DECISION. A majority vote of the Delegates at a Biennial Meeting of the Council at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the Member Organizations in cases of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Council, subject to any additional requirements of other provisions of these Articles.

ARTICLE IX

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. COMPOSITION. There shall be an Administrative Committee of nine persons representing seven Member Organizations; at least one Member Organization in each of the three respective Zones shall be represented. Each such person shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization he represents.

SECTION 2. ELECTION. (a) At each Biennial Meeting five Member Organizations shall be chosen, by ballot, to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years. The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association shall each be permanently entitled to appoint two representatives.

(b) Each Member Organization so chosen shall promptly appoint its representative to the Administrative Committee and give the Secretary notification of the appointment. If a Delegate of any Member Organization so chosen is present at the Biennial Meeting, he shall thereupon become the appointee of his Member Organization to the Administrative Committee.

(c) A Member Organization shall have the right to change its appointee to the Administrative Committee at its pleasure; any such change shall become effective when the Secretary receives notification thereof.

SECTION 3. DUTIES. The Administrative Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Council, subject to the provisions of these Articles and to directions of the Council.

SECTION 4. MEETINGS. The retiring Administrative Committee shall meet immed-

ately prior to the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

The Administrative Committee newly determined at the Biennial Meeting of the Council shall meet immediately after the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

SECTION 5. QUORUM. Three members present in person representing at least three Member Organizations shall constitute a quorum of the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 6. ACTION BETWEEN MEETINGS. Between meetings, the Administrative Committee may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the representatives to the Administrative Committee by the Secretary.

SECTION 7. MAJORITY DECISION. A majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the entire Administrative Committee in case of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Administrative Committee.

ARTICLE X

OFFICERS

SECTION 1. TITLES; ELECTION. (a) The officers of the Council shall be a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, and the Chairman and the Vice-Chairman shall each be one of the representatives to the Administrative Committee, provided, however, that until at least the Biennial Meeting in 1962, there shall instead be two Joint Chairmen, who shall be representatives of The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association. At each Biennial Meeting the Council shall determine by ballot the Member Organizations whose representatives to the Administrative Committee shall hold such respective offices for the ensuing two years. If either Member Organization concerned changes its representative to the Administrative Committee during such period, the successor shall assume the office concerned.

(b) The Secretary shall be appointed by the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 2. CHAIRMAN. The Chairman shall preside at meetings of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, and in general shall perform the customary duties of his office.

SECTION 3. VICE-CHAIRMAN. During the absence or inability of the Chairman, the

Vice-Chairman shall perform the duties of the Chairman.

SECTION 4. SECRETARY. The Secretary shall keep the records of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, give notices of all meetings and conduct all votes by mail, carry on the correspondence of the Council, and perform all other customary duties of his office.

ARTICLE XI

LANGUAGE

The official language of the Council is English.

ARTICLE XII

CARE OF TROPHY

SECTION 1. PROTECTION. The United States Golf Association shall retain title to the Championship Trophy, and shall make arrangements for its insurance and for its safekeeping during any suspension of the Championship.

SECTION 2. DISSOLUTION OF COUNCIL. In the event of dissolution of the Council, such use or other disposition of the Championship Trophy shall be made as The United States Golf Association may in its discretion determine.

ARTICLE XIII

AMENDMENTS

These Articles may be amended by action of the Council; provided, however, that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the Rules of Golf and the Rules of Amateur Status shall not be amended without the unanimous affirmative vote of the Member Organizations; that the provisions of these Articles with respect to permanent representation to the Administrative Committee and those with respect to the Joint Chairmen until the 1962 meeting shall not be amended without the affirmative votes of the respective Member Organizations concerned; and that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the ownership and custody of the Championship Trophy shall not be amended without the affirmative vote of The United States Golf Association; and provided further, that any amendment of these Articles increasing the monetary obligations of Member Organizations shall not be binding upon any Member Organization which voted against the amendment.
