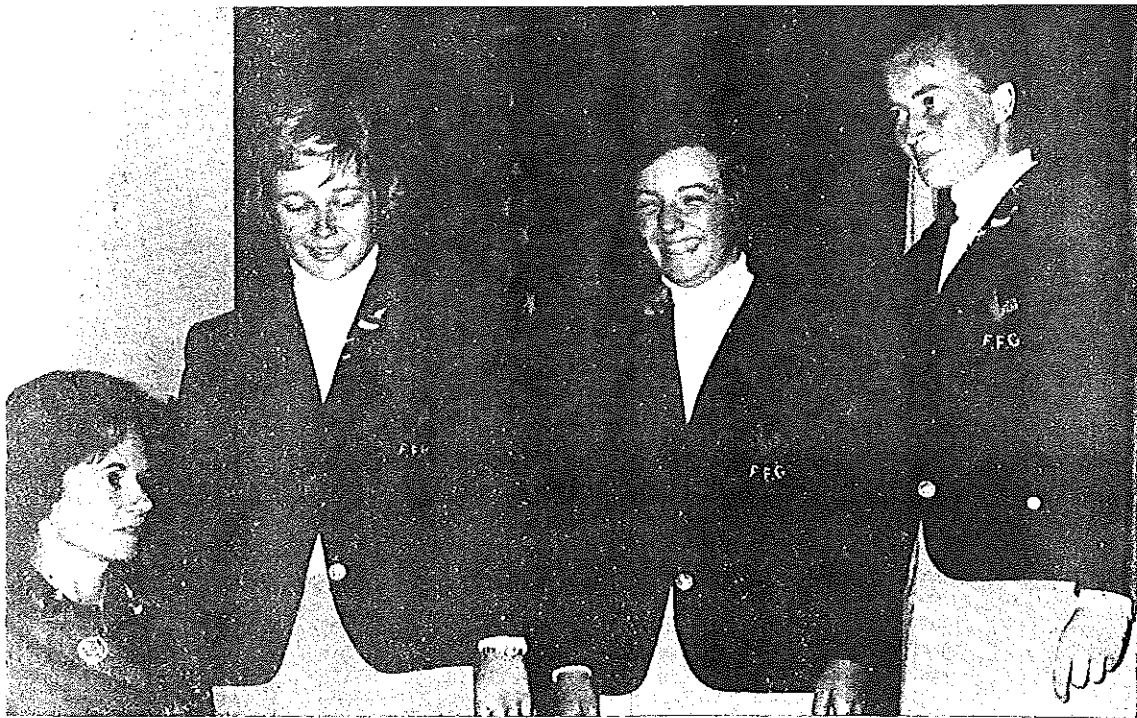

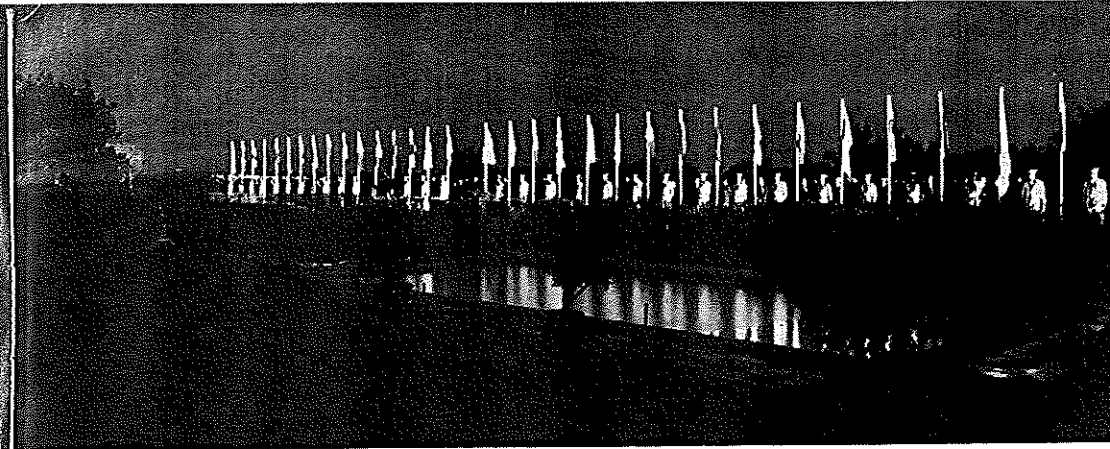

1964 MEN'S WORLD AMATEUR GOLF TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

An Englishman cried tears of joy, and a young Japanese swapped neckties with a Westerner as the World Amateur Team Championship drew to a close at the Olgiata Golf Club in Rome in 1964.

The Englishman cried because a British men's amateur team had not only beaten the Americans for the first time in 26 years but had beaten the world for the first time in history. It was a great triumph for Great Britain and Ireland in a meeting with 32 other nations.

This was the fourth World Amateur Team Championship for the Eisenhower Trophy under the auspices of the World Amateur Golf Council. On each occasion, beginning in 1958, it has been won by an English-speaking nation rich in golf history. The first Championship was won by Australia, the next two by the United States, the fourth by Great Britain-Ireland.

But what meaning do these meetings have for such a country as Iceland, which at that time had 540 golfers and five courses—none with bunkers? Although Iceland's representatives at Rome did not break 80, they were avid students of swing styles; they left Rome hopeful of obtaining American professional instruction, and so the

World Championship had special significance for them.

Malaysia's non-playing Captain found something at Rome which may help all the courses of his country. He was given information about improved grasses for putting greens developed in the United States.

And so there were values for the last teams as well as for the first, as is inevitable when golfers of 33 countries give their presence to one another.

The team of Great Britain and Ireland led after every round and at the end its margin was two strokes over Canada, 895-897. New Zealand was third with 900. The defending American team was fourth with 908.

The finish in the rain was classic. Keith Alexander needed birdies on the last five holes to bring Canada into a tie with Britain. He made four of them, but was bunkered on his approach to the home green. It was as courageous a golfing feat as could be imagined.

Britain's side was composed of Michael Bonallack, Michael Lunt, Ronald Shade and Rodney Foster. Behind the British scoring was a remarkable spirit engendered by the non-playing Captain, Joseph B. Carr.

On the second-place Canadian team

with Alexander were Gary Cowan, Douglas Silverberg and Nick Weslock; the non-playing Captain was W. Arthur Johnston, President of the Royal Canadian Golf Association. New Zealand passed the United States on the last day with a team comprising Edward McDougall, John Durry, Ross Murray and Stuart Jones; non-playing Captain was Philip L. Phillipps.

The competition is 72 holes stroke play. Each team may have three or four players, and they play all four rounds; the team's score consists of the best three individual scores in each round.

Under this scoring system, it counts heavily when several members of a team can mesh good scores in the same round; conversely, the debits are severe when that sort of coinciding is absent, and that's the way it was with the defending Americans.

The United States was in the running until the closing round. After 54 holes the British led 671-676 over the United States and Canada, tied for second, and they held on to win the Championship on the rainy final day despite Alexander's remarkable surge.

Although individual efforts are not officially recognized in the Team Championship, the world of golf saluted a 24-year-old from the Republic of China (Taiwan) for returning the lowest 72-hole score. Min Nan Hsieh scored 72-77-72-73—294. Hsieh and his teammates were a threat for the Eisenhower Trophy from the start. They ran third in the first 18 holes and finally tied with Italy for sixth place. They were sixth two years before also. These are tremendous performances for a country which then had only four golf courses, three of which were of nine holes.

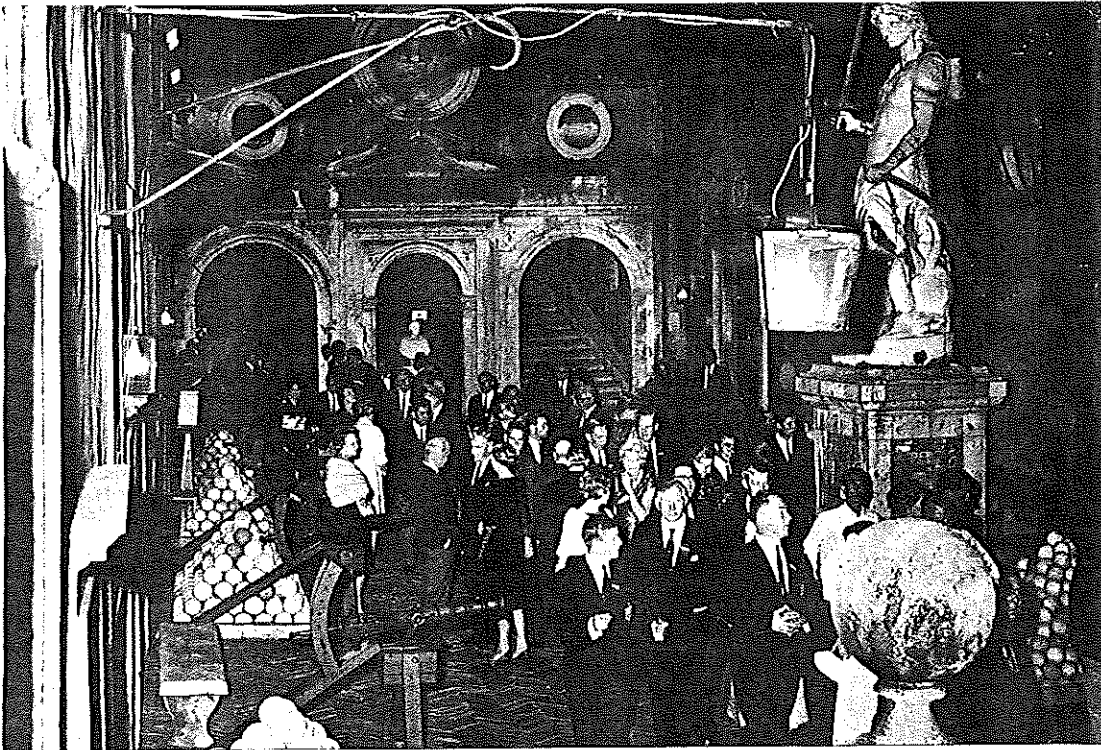
Argentina produced second low scorer, Raul Travieso, with 295. Next came Keith Alexander, of Canada, and Ross Murray, of New Zealand, at 297.

It is a vast undertaking to entertain the World Championship and the problems are magnified in a country where

golf is not a game of the people. But the Italian Golf Federation and the Olgiata Club were superb in the warmth of their hospitality and the efficiency of their preparations. President of both the Federation and the Club was Francesco Ruspoli Duca di Morignano. Prince Ruspoli was one of the organizers of the World Council in 1958. At the heart of Italy's work was Count Giuseppe Sabini, Secretary of the Golf Federation. For two years he devoted himself to the preparations.

Delegates and Duffers Cup

A 36-hole handicap competition for the Delegates and Duffers Cup was held on Olgiata's nine-hole course prior to the Championship.

The winner was Count Giuseppe Sabini, who found time from his duties as Secretary of the Italian Golf Federation and chief organizer for the Championship to score a net of 159-16-143. Second was J. W. Wilson, Australia, 173-28-145. Third was Julio Orvananos, Mexico, 160-14-146. There were 34 starters.

Low scorer in the 18-hole Guest Division was J. Porter Brinton, United States, 79-8-71 for 18 holes.

Meeting of World Council

The Biennial Meeting of the World Amateur Golf Council was held at the Olgiata Golf Club on October 6, 1964. Among the actions were:

1. Council sponsorship of a Women's World Amateur Team Championship beginning in 1966. A Women's Committee was appointed under the chairmanship of Vicomtesse de Saint-Sauveur, of France.

2. Acceptance of Mexico's invitation to entertain both men's and women's Championships in 1966.

3. Unanimous decision not to seek inclusion of golf in the Olympic and the Pan American Games.

Notation was made with regret of the passing of Shun Nomura, of Japan, and

Tim Jackson, of South Africa, who participated in the Council's organization meeting in 1958.

1st WOMEN'S WORLD AMATEUR GOLF TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

As entries began to arrive for the first Women's World Amateur Team Championship, apprehension began to mount. An entry of 15 to 17 teams had been expected, but 27 nations filed. Even though eventually two could not attend, 25 teams were present. In the end, the reasons for worry turned out to be the reasons for success.

The Women's World Amateur Team Championship was instituted by the French Golf Federation on a suggestion by the United States Golf Association. The first Championship was held at the St. Germain Golf Club, near Paris, and despite the initial apprehension it became an instant success. The weather was perfect, the crowds were large and the scoring, on the whole, was good.

France won by one stroke over the United States, 588-589. Each team was allowed three players; each day the two best individual scores made up the

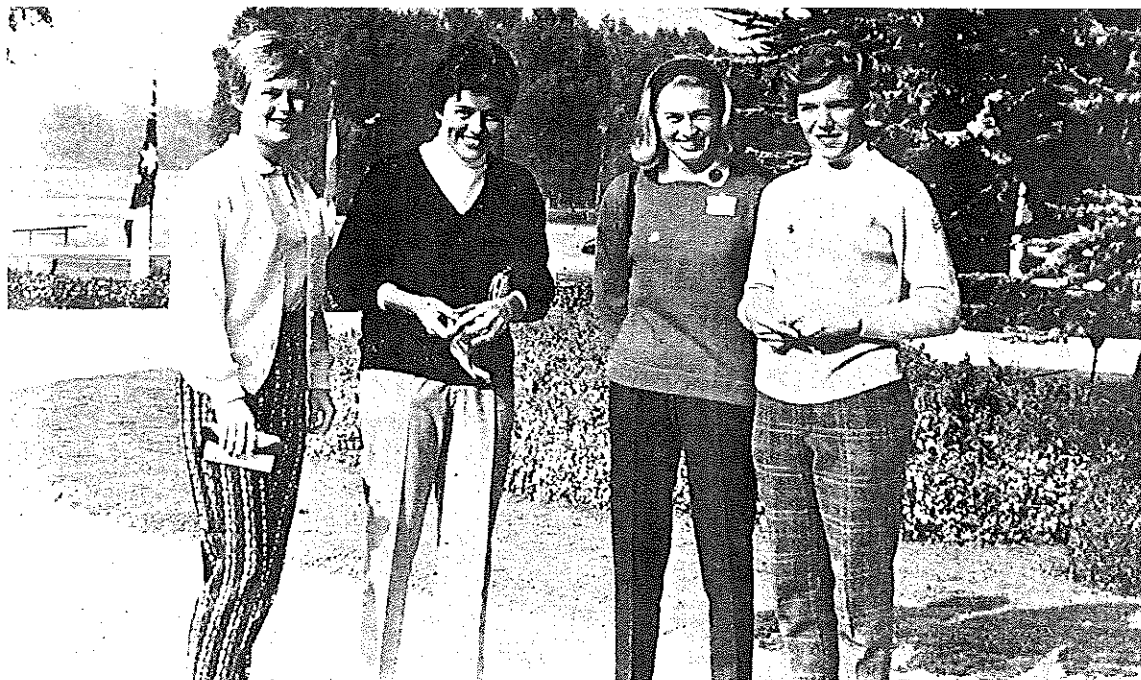
team's score. The sum of the four daily totals gave the team total for the Espirito Santo Trophy.

Paced by Miss Catherine Lacoste who began with rounds of 72 and 71, France led by one stroke after the first round and by two over the United States at the end of two rounds. England was third, another two strokes behind, and Canada trailed by 12 strokes.

Miss Carol Sorenson, with 72, and Miss Barbara Fay White, with 73, sent the United States into the lead after three rounds, 440-441.

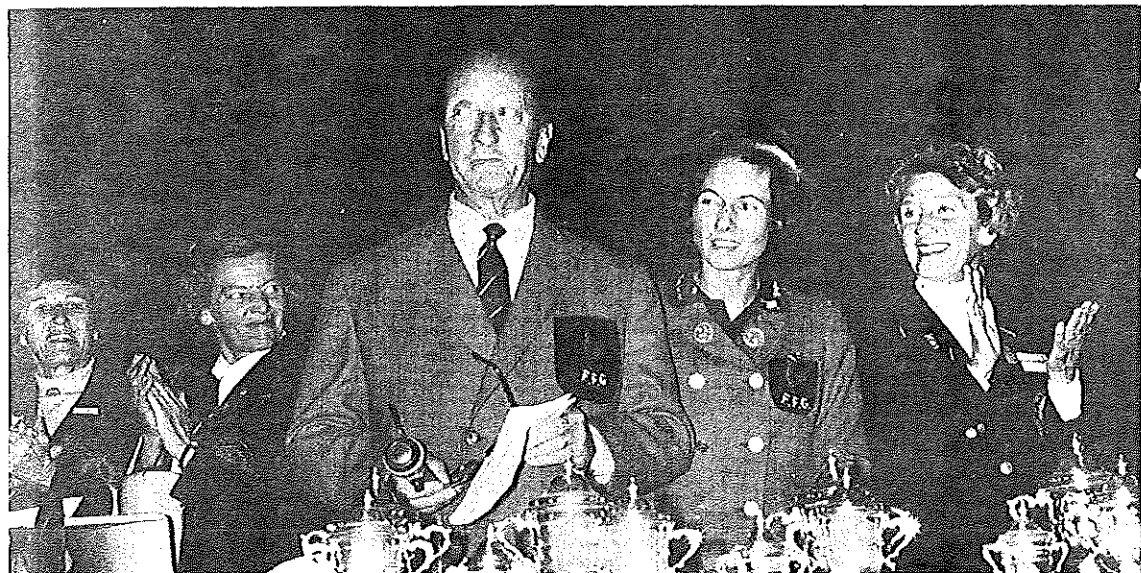
The finish on the fourth day was close, with considerable pressure. For France, Miss Brigitte Varangot had 77 and Miss Claudine Cros 74, while for the United States Miss White had 76 and Miss Sorenson 73.

With the United States Champion, Miss Barbara McIntire, and Miss Lacoste still on the course, the United States led by two strokes. After 14

holes Miss McIntire was even with par. Until the par-3 16th hole Miss Lacoste was one below par. Miss Lacoste had a 5 at 16 and then, believing that she had lost the Championship for France, she played the two final holes superbly, scoring 4s on each of them and finishing with 73.

Then Miss McIntire became bunkered on each of the last two holes, taking five at the 17th and six at the 18th, losing three strokes to Miss Lacoste. Therein lay the one-stroke margin by which France won.

The low individual scorers for the 72 holes were Misses Sorenson and Lacoste. Both had 294—six strokes above par for the St. Germain Club.

This first Championship was held under the able chairmanship of the Vicomtesse de Saint-Sauveur. The following week the World Amateur Golf Council agreed to sponsor the Women's Team Championship starting in 1966 and the Vicomtesse was named Chairman of the Council's Women's Committee.

Hostesses. The French Golf Federation, leaving nothing undone, assigned individual hostesses to each team.

ARTICLES OF THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL

Adopted May 2, 1958. Amended October 7, 1958 and October 6, 1964.

ARTICLE I

The name of this council is THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

SECTION 1. FRIENDSHIP AND SPORTSMANSHIP THROUGH GOLF. The object of the Council is to foster friendship and sportsmanship among the peoples of the world through the conduct biennially of an Amateur Team Championship for The Eisenhower Trophy.

SECTION 2. RULES OF GOLF. The Championship shall be conducted in accordance with the Rules of Golf as approved by The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, and The United States Golf Association; however, if those organizations should have differing codes, the code of the host country shall apply.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. ELIGIBILITY. Membership in the Council is open to any organization which:

(a) Constitutes the sole central authority for amateur golf in its country; and

(b) Has adopted and administers the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association.

SECTION 2. ELECTION. An application for membership shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such other data as the Administrative Committee determines.

An applicant may be elected to Membership by the Council after determination by the Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

SECTION 3. FINANCES (a) The expenses of the Council shall be limited to the following:

(1) Insurance and maintenance of the Championship Trophy;

(2) Provision of prizes for individuals;

(3) Cost of stationery, postage, printing and other communications incurred by the Secretary of the Council.

All such expenses shall be shared equally by the Member Organizations and shall be payable annually in November to the Secretary. Each such payment shall be in the currency of the Secretary's country, unless prohibited by law or government regulation.

The income of the Council shall be limited to reimbursement of or other provision for the foregoing expenses.

No Member Organization may incur any expense for the Council, and no representative of the Council shall have authority to incur any expense except as expressly stated herein.

(b) Any other expense incident to the affairs of the Council shall be borne by the Member Organization whose representative incurs such expense.

(c) The expense of conducting the Championship shall be borne by the Member Organization entertaining it.

SECTION 4. OBLIGATIONS AND DISCIPLINE. The acceptance of membership in the Council shall bind each Member Organization to uphold all the provisions of these Articles and any rules or actions of the Council or the Administrative Committee.

Any Member Organization failing in these obligations or ceasing to meet the eligibility requirements may be suspended or expelled by the Council.

SECTION 5. WITHDRAWAL. Any Member Organization may withdraw from membership by notifying the Secretary to that effect.

Any Member Organization so withdrawing shall remain obligated for its share of the Council's expenses for the year in which withdrawal occurred.

ARTICLE IV CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. TIME. The Championship shall be held biennially, starting in 1958, on such dates as the Council shall deter-

mine. Normally, the Championship shall be held in the second or the third week of October.

SECTION 2. PLACE. (a) The Championship shall be rotated among the three following zones in the order stated:

(1) *European-African Zone*—Countries of Europe, Africa and the Middle East.

(2) *American Zone*—Countries of North America, Caribbean America and South America.

(3) *Australasian Zone*—Countries of Asia, Australia, New Zealand and Oceania.

(b) The location of each Championship will be determined by the Council at its Biennial Meeting immediately preceding.

Invitations to entertain the Championship shall be submitted by Member Organizations to the Secretary at least three months in advance of the Biennial Meeting. The Secretary shall inform all Member Organizations of such invitations at least one month in advance of the Meeting.

ARTICLE V

AMATEUR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. ENTRY DATES. Each Member Organization shall inform the Secretary biennially as to whether or not it will enter the Championship; such notification shall reach the Secretary not later than three months before the Championship. Later entries may be accepted if the Member Organization entertaining the Championship approves.

Each Member Organization which enters the Championship shall inform the Secretary of the personnel of its Team not later than one month before the Championship. Substitutions may be made at any subsequent time at the pleasure of the Member Organization.

SECTION 2. QUALIFICATION OF PLAYERS; AMATEUR STATUS. The players comprising each Team shall be:

(a) Amateur golfers under the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews or The United States Golf Association; and

(b) Citizens of the country of the Member Organization represented, except that in cases where a Team of citizens would be impracticable, players normally resident in the country may be included.

Each Team shall have a captain, who may be either a player or a non-player.

SECTION 3. FORM OF PLAY. (a) Each Team shall consist of three or four players.

(b) The Championship shall consist of 72 holes stroke play: 18 holes each on four consecutive days of the Championship period. All the players of each Team shall be eligible for all four rounds; disqualification of a player under the Rules of Golf in any round shall not be effective for any subsequent round unless the Administrative Committee determines otherwise.

In each 18-hole round, the total of the three lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

The total of the three-player Team Scores for the four rounds shall be the Team's score for the Championship.

The Champion shall be the Team with the lowest such total score for 72 holes.

(c) If a tie for the Championship occurs, the Teams concerned shall play off at 18 holes stroke play, the exact day to be determined in advance by the Member Organization entertaining the Championship. The Team with the lowest total score by three players shall win the play-off. Should an 18-hole play-off result in a further tie, the Teams so tied shall immediately continue to play off hole by hole until the winner is determined; the total of the three lowest scores will be the Team score for each hole.

(d) Any tie for second or third place shall be determined by a hole-by-hole play-off immediately after conclusion of the Championship proper and on the day of the fourth round; the total of the three lowest scores will be the team score for each hole.

SECTION 4. PRIZES. (a) The Eisenhower Trophy, presented to the Council by friends of golf in the United States through The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

(b) Miniature replicas of The Eisenhower Trophy shall be awarded for the permanent possession of the Member Organizations whose teams finish first, second and third in each Championship.

(c) A uniform type of prize for individuals shall be awarded to the players and the Captain of the winning Team, the second-place Team and the third-place Team.

(d) No other prizes may be accepted from any source, except symbolic gifts by a Member Organization to its Team.

ARTICLE VI

CONDUCT OF CHAMPIONSHIP

The Member Organization entertaining the Championship shall have the honor of and be responsible for planning and conducting the Championship, subject to the applicable provisions of these Articles and approval by the Administrative Committee, and for all the expenses in connection therewith except the expenses of the Teams. Such Member Organization may charge admission to spectators and otherwise raise income as it may desire, and any excess of the proceeds over the expense shall be disposed of as the Council may determine.

No financial liability shall attach to either the Council or to any Member Organization other than the Member Organization entertaining the Championship.

ARTICLE VII

EXPENSES OF TEAMS

Each Member Organization shall be responsible for the expenses of its Team's players and captain.

ARTICLE VIII

COUNCIL MEETINGS

SECTION 1. BIENNIAL MEETING. The Council shall meet biennially on the day before the start of the Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting of the Council each Member Organization shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization, and who shall be present at the Meeting in person. Appointment of Delegates shall be certified to the Secretary in advance.

SECTION 2. QUORUM. Ten Member Organizations represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting of the Council.

SECTION 3. ACTION WITHOUT MEETING.

Between Biennial Meetings, the Council may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the Member Organizations by the Secretary pursuant to direction of the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 4. MAJORITY DECISION. A majority vote of the Delegates at a Biennial Meeting of the Council at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the Member Organizations in cases of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Council, subject to any additional requirements of other provisions of these Articles.

ARTICLE IX

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. COMPOSITION. There shall be an Administrative Committee of nine persons representing seven Member Organizations; at least one Member Organization in each of the three respective Zones shall be represented. Each such person shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization he represents.

SECTION 2. ELECTION. (a) At each Biennial Meeting five Member Organizations shall be chosen, by ballot, to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years. The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association shall each be permanently entitled to appoint two representatives.

(b) Each Member Organization so chosen shall promptly appoint its representative to the Administrative Committee and give the Secretary notification of the appointment. If a Delegate of any Member Organization so chosen is present at the Biennial Meeting, he shall thereupon become the appointee of his Member Organization to the Administrative Committee.

(c) A Member Organization shall have the right to change its appointee to the Administrative Committee at its pleasure; any such change shall become effective when the Secretary receives notification thereof.

SECTION 3. DUTIES. The Administrative Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Council, subject to the provisions of these Articles and to directions of the Council.

SECTION 4. MEETINGS. The retiring Administrative Committee shall meet immedi-

ately prior to the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

The Administrative Committee newly determined at the Biennial Meeting of the Council shall meet immediately after the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

SECTION 5. QUORUM. Three members present in person representing at least three Member Organizations shall constitute a quorum of the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 6. ACTION BETWEEN MEETINGS. Between meetings, the Administrative Committee may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the representatives to the Administrative Committee by the Secretary.

SECTION 7. MAJORITY DECISION. A majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the entire Administrative Committee in case of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Administrative Committee.

ARTICLE X

OFFICERS

SECTION 1. TITLES; ELECTION. (a) The officers of the Council shall be a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, and the Chairman and the Vice-Chairman shall each be one of the representatives to the Administrative Committee, provided, however, that until at least the Biennial Meeting in 1962, there shall instead be two Joint Chairmen, who shall be representatives of The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association. At each Biennial Meeting the Council shall determine by ballot the Member Organizations whose representatives to the Administrative Committee shall hold such respective offices for the ensuing two years. If either Member Organization concerned changes its representative to the Administrative Committee during such period, the successor shall assume the office concerned.

(b) The Secretary shall be appointed by the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 2. CHAIRMAN. The Chairman shall preside at meetings of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, and in general shall perform the customary duties of his office.

SECTION 3. VICE-CHAIRMAN. During the absence or inability of the Chairman, the

Vice-Chairman shall perform the duties of the Chairman.

SECTION 4. SECRETARY. The Secretary shall keep the records of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, give notices of all meetings and conduct all votes by mail, carry on the correspondence of the Council, and perform all other customary duties of his office.

ARTICLE XI

LANGUAGE

The official language of the Council is English.

ARTICLE XII

CARE OF TROPHY

SECTION 1. PROTECTION. The United States Golf Association shall retain title to the Championship Trophy, and shall make arrangements for its insurance and for its safekeeping during any suspension of the Championship.

SECTION 2. DISSOLUTION OF COUNCIL. In the event of dissolution of the Council, such use or other disposition of the Championship Trophy shall be made as The United States Golf Association may in its discretion determine.

ARTICLE XIII

AMENDMENTS

These Articles may be amended by action of the Council; provided, however, that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the Rules of Golf and the Rules of Amateur Status shall not be amended without the unanimous affirmative vote of the Member Organizations; that the provisions of these Articles with respect to permanent representation to the Administrative Committee and those with respect to the Joint Chairmen until the 1962 meeting shall not be amended without the affirmative votes of the respective Member Organizations concerned; and that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the ownership and custody of the Championship Trophy shall not be amended without the affirmative vote of The United States Golf Association; and provided further, that any amendment of these Articles increasing the monetary obligations of Member Organizations shall not be binding upon any Member Organization which voted against the amendment.
