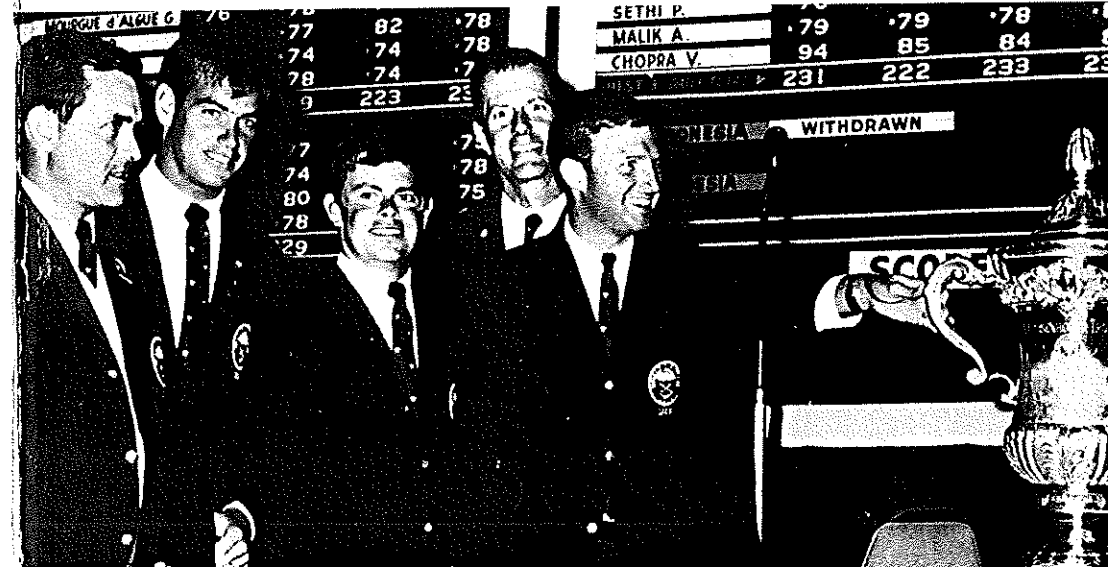

1968 MEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

The World Amateur Team Championship was begun in 1958 with the objective of promoting friendship and sportsmanship among peoples of the earth. Certainly through its first 10 years that purpose has been fulfilled.

That first decade seems to have had the additional effect of stimulating the development of golf throughout the world. Consider what happened in Melbourne, Australia, during October of 1968.

During the second round of the World Championship for the Eisenhower Trophy a score of 70 went up behind the name of Jalal Deran. Deran is from Malaysia, quite a small nation. That 70 gave him a 36-hole score of 146, and by contrast, Bruce Fleisher, the United States Amateur Champion, had played the first two rounds in 77-76—153.

Also consider the case of the Republic of China. In the inaugural Championship played at St. Andrews, Scotland, in 1958, China finished 26th in a field of 29 teams. In Melbourne it finished eighth. China has eight golf courses.

Clearly, then, the standards of play are rising as the game expands.

Golf still is dominated, though, by the English-speaking nations. No others have finished higher than fifth in the Team Championship.

The United States won at Melbourne by one stroke over Great Britain and Ireland, 868-869. Canada was third with 885, and Australia, the host nation and defending Champion, was fourth with 886. The competition was played over the Royal Melbourne Golf Club's course.

The Championship was decided on the very last green, and it gave the United States its first Eisenhower Trophy victory since 1962. The putt that Richard L. Siderowf holed for the United States was the decisive stroke of the event, but it was a team effort to which everyone contributed—Fleisher, Jack Lewis, and Marvin (Vinny) Giles III, with an especial contribution from William C. Campbell, the non-playing Captain.

A 68 by Kevin Donohoe paced Australia to a score of 216 in the first round and a lead of two strokes over Great Britain and Ireland. The United States then was four strokes behind with 220.

A 68 by Giles and 69 by Lewis vaulted the United States into the lead, 431-433 over Great Britain and Ireland in the second round. Australia, meanwhile, had dropped back to 438.

Michael Bonallack, Britain's great amateur, then scored a superb 66 in the third round, Ronald D.B.M. Shade added 70, Gordon Cosh 71, and Britain shot ahead with a 54-hole team score of 640 against the 647 of the United States. Peter Oosterhuis had the bad fortune to shoot 72, a most useful score ordinarily, but see it not count toward the team total, for in this competition only the three lowest scores of each four-man team count each day.

Britain and Ireland that day had a total of 207, a score that was not matched through the Championship.

Thus, going into the final round the United States was seven strokes behind, a seemingly hopeless position. Bonallack, though, in that final round went from 66 to 76, Oosterhuis had another 76, and Cosh's 79 didn't count.

Fleisher had come in with 75 for the Americans, Giles had scored 73, and Lewis' 78 was thrown out.

This left the decision up to Siderowf and Shade, who were grouped together. The Fleisher and Giles scores had helped the United States pick up four strokes and the Americans were now just three strokes behind with Siderowf and Shade still on the course.

Lowest scorers. Marvin Giles III, of the United States (top), and Michael F. Bonallack, of Great Britain and Ireland (bottom) had the lowest individual scores of 286 for 72 holes.



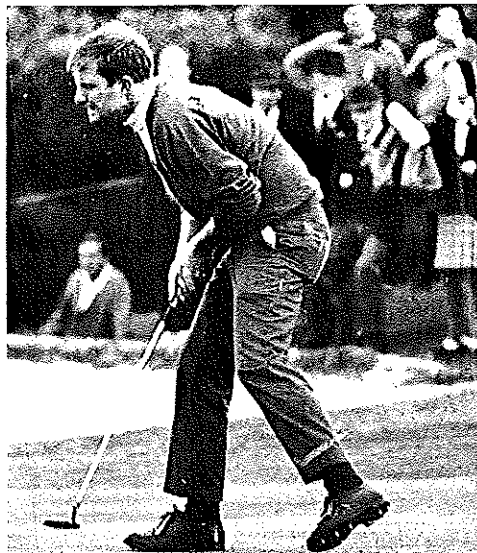
The Putt that Missed. Ronald D. B. M. Shade, of Great Britain and Ireland, missed a putt on the final hole at the Royal Melbourne Golf Club that could have won a tie for his team.

It looked good for Britain when Siderowf came out 30 feet from the hole while Shade chipped up six feet away. Siderowf's first putt still left him three feet away, and now Shade had the opportunity to save the day for the British. If he should hole the putt and Siderowf miss, Britain would win the Cup. If they both holed, the teams would tie. If he should miss and Siderowf hole, the United States would win.

Shade tapped the putt. It ran true to the hole, nipped a piece of it, but stayed out. Siderowf holed his putt and the Championship was over. The United States had won for the third time.

Individual honors are not awarded in the World Team Championships but it should be noted that Bonallack and Giles had scores of 286 over a very fine golf course. Siderowf and Oosterhuls shared the second best score of 289.

The Australian Golf Union, with Alex A. Mills as President and William H. Richardson as Secretary, was a most affable host, and the hospitality of the Australian Ladies' Golf Union, with Mrs. T. R. Street as President and Miss Phyllis Perry, Honorary Secretary, was unsurpassed. Thomas B. Swanson was President of the Victoria Golf Club, where the Women's Championship was played, Fred J. Dawborn was Captain, and John

Delegates and Duffers Cup

At each Championship, officials of the host association, non-playing Captains, and Delegates to the World Amateur Golf Council meet in a 36-hole handicap competition for the Delegates and Duffers Cup.

The Cup was won for the second time by Hord W. Hardin, of the United States, with a score of 78-5-73.

Meeting of World Council

The biennial meeting of the World Amateur Golf Council was held at the Royal Melbourne Golf Club on October 8, 1968.

Among the actions were:

1. Decision that invitations to entertain a Championship must include a condition that the host Member Organization would invite and be willing to accept teams from all Member Organizations.

2. Acceptance of the invitation of Spain to entertain both men's and women's Championships in 1970.

3. The frequency of the Women's

Golf, as we know it today, is traceable directly to Scotland where it was played on the dunesland off the North Sea at least as early as the 16th century. As the game spread it gradually moved inland, and now most courses of the world are placed not on the dunesland, or linksland, but in park-like settings well away from the sea.

It was entirely appropriate then that the courses selected for the 1968 World Amateur Team Championship and the Women's World Amateur Team Championship were laid out on the same kind of land as their ancestors.

The Women's Championship for the Espirito Santo Trophy was played at the Victoria Golf Club, Cheltenham, Victoria, in the Melbourne sand belt near Port Philip Bay. Except for the tea trees and other foliage that frame most holes, you might be back in Scotland. Bunkers are large, deep, and plentiful—you have only to dig a hole and you strike sand—and the greens are firm, fast, and hard to hold when they're dry.

One other feature distinguishes Scottish courses—the weather. The wind nearly always sweeps in off the sea, bringing with it cold and rain. The Australian weather cooperated perfectly. Wet, cold, and windy weather prevailed throughout the Women's Championship, and hailstones battered the course one day.

Teams representing 17 countries participated, and the United States won for the second consecutive time. The final total for the United States was 616. Australia was second with 621, and France third with 622.

The American victory was a real team effort. Each member contributed to the scoring and encouraged her team-mates.

From the beginning the Championship was among the United States, France, and

Australia. France had the same three players who won the first Championship in 1964 — Miss Catherine Lacoste, Miss Brigitte Varangot, and Mrs. Claudine Cros Rubin — and they tied the United States in the first round with 156. Australia, with Miss Elizabeth Blackmore, Miss Marea Hickey, and Mrs. Ray Thomas, was two strokes behind with 158.

France went ahead by two strokes over Australia in the second round, 308-310, and the United States fell another two strokes behind. A 75 by Mrs. David Welts, and 76s by Miss Jane Bastanchury and Miss Shelley Hamlin brought the United States back into a tie for the lead with Australia after 54 holes, with France one stroke behind. Australia and the United States had 463, France 464.

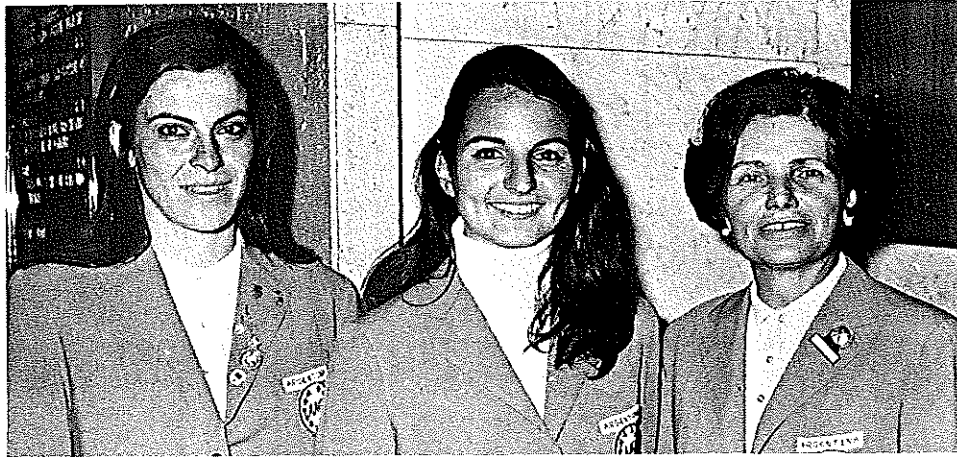
Steadiness in the gusty winds carried the day for the Americans. Miss Hamlin had her lowest score of the Championship, a 75, and Miss Bastanchury had 78 for the counting scores, giving the United States 153 for the day. Australia's counting scores were 77 and 81 for 158, and France had 76 and 82 for another 158.

Par of 73 for the 6,040-yard course was never threatened; the best scores were eight 75s. Miss Lacoste had two of them and a final 72-hole score of 307, lowest in the field. Miss Hickey, also with two 75s, was a stroke back with 308, and Miss Hamlin's 309 was third best.

Caddies for the ladies Championship were volunteer amateur golfers who pulled caddie carts. The Victorian Ladies Golf Union recruited them from its membership. Fifty-one were needed for the eight days of practice and play, and 71 responded.

Attendance was especially encouraging. An estimated 3,500 spectators attended, about the same as for the Men's Championship.

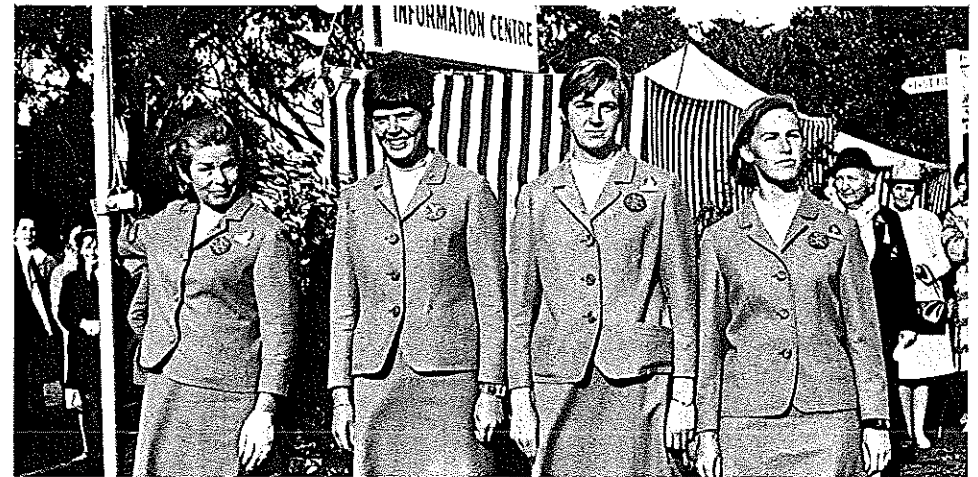

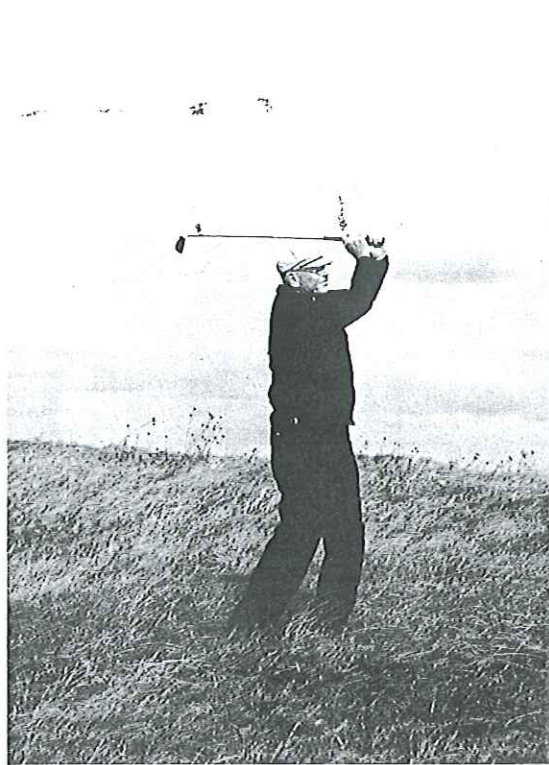

1969 SENIOR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

Golf has been proud of many of its traits; the challenge it presents to the individual, the sportsmanship it breeds, the good fellowship, and the fact that it is a game that can be played for a lifetime.

Never is that latter trait more evident than in Senior competition.

Senior golf has been with us for a long time, but it seems to be increasing annually, and in 1967 a World Senior Team Championship was added to the competitions conducted by the World Amateur Golf Council.

The inaugural event was played at the Pinehurst Country Club, Pinehurst, North Carolina, that year. The second Championship was held at the Old Course at St. Andrews, Scotland, in October of 1969.

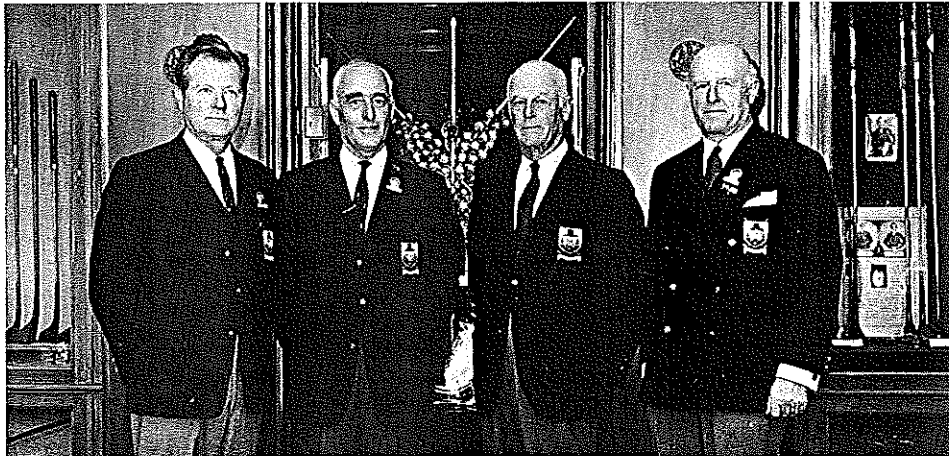
team of Curtis Person Sr., David (Spec) Goldman, Merrill Carlsmith, and Robert Loufek scored 908 for 72 holes and won the 1969 event by 21 strokes over Canada, with 929.

Goldman's opening round 75 paced the American team to a 230-235 lead over Great Britain and Ireland, and from then on the United States only added to its lead. The Americans led, 456-467 over Canada after the second round, and 679-700 over Canada after the third round.

Thirteen teams competed for the Shun Nomura Trophy, two more than in 1967.

Goldman followed his opening 75 with 73 in the second round, then 74 and 76 for a 72-hole total of 298, lowest in the field. Dr. George Bieelow of Canada had the

ARTICLES

OF THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL

Adopted May 2, 1958. Amended October 7, 1958; October 6, 1964; October 26, 1966; and October 8, 1968.

ARTICLE I

The name of this council is THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL.

(1) Insurance and maintenance of the Championship Trophy;

(2) Provision of prizes for individuals;

(3) Cost of stationery, postage, printing and other communications incurred by the Secretary of the Council.

ARTICLE II

OBJECT

SECTION 1. FRIENDSHIP AND SPORTSMANSHIP THROUGH GOLF. The object of the Council is to foster friendship and sportsmanship among the peoples of the world through the conduct biennially of an Amateur Team Championship for the Eisenhower Trophy.

All such expenses shall be shared equally by the Member Organizations and shall be payable annually in November to the Secretary. Each such payment shall be in the currency of the Secretary's country, unless prohibited by law or government regulation.

SECTION 2. RULES OF GOLF. The Championship shall be conducted in accordance with the Rules of Golf as approved by The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, and The United States Golf Association; however, if those organizations should have differing codes, the code of the host country shall apply.

The income of the Council shall be limited to reimbursement of or other provision for the foregoing expenses.

No Member Organization may incur any expense for the Council, and no representative of the Council shall have authority to incur any expense except as expressly stated herein.

ARTICLE III

MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. ELIGIBILITY. Membership in the Council is open to any organization which:

(a) Constitutes the sole central authority for amateur golf in its country; and

(b) Has adopted and administers the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association.

(b) Any other expense incident to the affairs of the Council shall be borne by the Member Organization whose representative incurs such expense.

(c) The expense of conducting the Championship shall be borne by the Member Organization entertaining it.

SECTION 2. ELECTION. An application for membership shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such other data as the Administrative Committee determines.

An applicant may be elected to Membership by the Council after determination by the Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

SECTION 4. OBLIGATIONS AND DISCIPLINE. The acceptance of membership in the Council shall bind each Member Organization to uphold all the provisions of these Articles and any rules or actions of the Council or the Administrative Committee.

Any Member Organization failing in these obligations or ceasing to meet the eligibility requirements may be suspended or expelled by the Council.

SECTION 5. WITHDRAWAL. Any Member Organization may withdraw from membership by notifying the Secretary to that effect.

Any Member Organization so withdrawing shall remain obligated for its share of the Council's expenses for the year in which withdrawal occurred.

SECTION 3. FINANCES (a) The expenses of the Council shall be limited to the following:

ARTICLE IV

CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. TIME. The Championship shall be held biennially, starting in 1958, on such dates as the Council shall determine. Normally, the Championship shall be held in the second or the third week of October.

SECTION 2. PLACE. (a) The Championship shall be rotated among the three following zones in the order stated:

(1) *European - African Zone* — Countries of Europe, Africa and the Middle East.

(2) *American Zone* — Countries of North America, Caribbean America and South America.

(3) *Australasian Zone* — Countries of Asia, Australia, New Zealand and Oceania.

(b) The location of each Championship will be determined by the Council at its Biennial Meeting immediately preceding.

Invitations to entertain the Championship shall be submitted by Member Organizations to the Secretary at least three months in advance of the Biennial Meeting. The Secretary shall inform all Member Organizations of such invitations at least one month in advance of the Meeting.

Championship invitations shall not be issued and pertinent advertising/promotion shall not be engaged in more than 3½ years in advance.

ARTICLE V

AMATEUR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. ENTRY DATES. Each Member Organization shall inform the Secretary biennially as to whether or not it will enter the Championship; such notification shall reach the Secretary not later than three months before the Championship. Later entries may be accepted if the Member Organization entertaining the Championship approves.

Each Member Organization which enters the Championship shall inform the Secretary of the personnel of its Team not later than one month before the Championship. Substitutions may be made at any subsequent time at the pleasure of the Member Organization.

SECTION 2. QUALIFICATION OF PLAYERS; AMATEUR STATUS. The players comprising each Team shall be:

(a) Amateur golfers under the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews or The United States Golf Association; and

(b) Citizens of the country of the Member Organization represented, except that in cases where a Team of citizens would be impracticable, players normally resident in the country may be included.

Each Team shall have a captain, who may be either a player or a non-player.

SECTION 3. FORM OF PLAY. (a) Each Team shall consist of three or four players.

(b) The Championship shall consist of 72 holes stroke play: 18 holes each on four consecutive days of the Championship period. All the players of each Team shall be eligible for all four rounds; disqualification of a player under the Rules of Golf in any round shall not be effective for any subsequent round unless the Administrative Committee determines otherwise.

In each 18-hole round, the total of the three lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

The total of the three-player Team Scores for the four rounds shall be the Team's score for the Championship.

The Champion shall be the Team with the lowest such total score for 72 holes.

(c) If a tie for the Championship occurs, the Teams concerned shall play off at 18 holes stroke play, the exact day to be determined in advance by the Member Organization entertaining the Championship. The Team with the lowest total score by three players shall win the play-off. Should an 18-hole play-off result in a further tie, the Teams so tied shall immediately continue to play off hole by hole until the winner is determined; the total of the three lowest scores will be the Team score for each hole.

(d) Any tie for second or third place shall not be played off.

SECTION 4. PRIZES. (a) The Eisenhower Trophy, presented to the Council by friends of golf in the United States through The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

(b) A uniform type of prize for individuals shall be awarded to the players and the Captain of the winning Team, the second-place Team and the third-place Team.

(c) No other prizes may be accepted from any source, except symbolic gifts by a Member Organization to its Team.

ARTICLE VI

CONDUCT OF CHAMPIONSHIP

The Member Organization entertaining the Championship shall have the honor of and be responsible for planning and conducting the Championship, subject to the applicable provisions of these Articles and approval by the Administrative Committee, and for all the expenses in connection therewith except the expenses of the Teams. Such Member Organization may charge admission to spectators and otherwise raise income as it may desire, and any excess of the proceeds over the expense shall be disposed of as the Council may determine.

No financial liability shall attach to either the Council or to any Member Organization other than the Member Organization entertaining the Championship.

ARTICLE VII

EXPENSES OF TEAMS

Each Member Organization shall be responsible for the expenses of its Team's players and captain.

ARTICLE VIII

COUNCIL MEETINGS

SECTION 1. BIENNIAL MEETING. The Council shall meet biennially on the day before the start of the Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting of the Council each Member Organization shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization, and who shall be present at the Meeting in person. Appointment of Delegates shall be certified to the Secretary in advance.

SECTION 2. QUORUM. Ten Member Organizations represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting of the Council.

SECTION 3. ACTION WITHOUT MEETING. Between Biennial Meetings, the Council may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the Member Organizations by the Secretary pursuant to direction of the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 4. MAJORITY DECISION. A majority vote of the Delegates at a Biennial Meeting of the Council at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the Member Organizations in cases of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Council, subject to any additional requirements of other provisions of these Articles.

ARTICLE IX

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. COMPOSITION. There shall be an Administrative Committee of nine persons representing seven Member Organizations; at least one Member Organization in each of the three respective Zones shall be represented. Each such person shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization he represents.

SECTION 2. NOMINATION, ELECTION. (a) The Administrative Committee shall serve as a Nominating Committee and shall propose to the Biennial Meeting a slate of Member Organizations to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee. Additional nominations may be made by delegates to the Biennial Meeting. The country entertaining the next Championship shall be represented in the Administrative Committee.

(b) At each Biennial Meeting five Member Organizations shall be chosen, by ballot, to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years. The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association shall each be permanently entitled to appoint two representatives.

(c) Each Member Organization so chosen shall promptly appoint its representative to the Administrative Committee and give the Secretary notification of the appointment. If a Delegate of any Member Organization so chosen is present at the Biennial Meeting, he shall thereupon become the appointee of his Member Organization to the Administrative Committee.

(d) A Member Organization shall have the right to change its appointee to the Administrative Committee at its pleasure; any such change shall become effective when the Secretary receives notification

SECTION 3. DUTIES. The Administrative Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Council, subject to the provisions of these Articles and to directions of the Council.

SECTION 4. MEETINGS. The retiring Administrative Committee shall meet immediately prior to the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

The Administrative Committee newly determined at the Biennial Meeting of the Council shall meet immediately after the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

SECTION 5. QUORUM. Three members present in person representing at least three Member Organizations shall constitute a quorum of the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 6. ACTION BETWEEN MEETINGS. Between meetings, the Administrative Committee may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the representatives to the Administrative Committee by the Secretary.

SECTION 7. MAJORITY DECISION. A majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the entire Administrative Committee in case of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Administrative Committee.

ARTICLE X OFFICERS

SECTION 1. TITLES; ELECTION. (a) The officers of the Council shall be two Joint Chairmen, who shall be representatives of The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, and a Secretary. The Joint Chairmen shall each be one of the representatives to the Administrative Committee. At each Biennial Meeting the Council shall determine by ballot the Member Organizations whose representatives to the Administrative Committee shall hold such respective offices for the ensuing two years. If any Member Organization concerned changes its representative to the Administrative Committee during such period, the successor shall assume the office concerned.

(b) The Secretary shall be appointed by the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 2. CHAIRMAN. One of the Joint Chairmen shall preside at meetings of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, and in general shall perform the customary duties of his office.

SECTION 3. SECRETARY. The Secretary shall keep the records of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, give notices of all meetings and conduct all votes by mail, carry on the correspondence of the Council, and perform all other customary duties of his office.

ARTICLE XI LANGUAGE

The official language of the Council is English.

ARTICLE XII CARE OF TROPHY

SECTION 1. PROTECTION. The United States Golf Association shall retain title to the Championship Trophy, and shall make arrangements for its insurance and for its safekeeping during any suspension of the Championship.

SECTION 2. DISSOLUTION OF COUNCIL. In the event of dissolution of the Council, such use or other disposition of the Championship Trophy shall be made as The United States Golf Association may in its discretion determine.

ARTICLE XIII AMENDMENTS

These Articles may be amended by action of the Council; provided, however, that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the Rules of Golf and the Rules of Amateur Status shall not be amended without the unanimous affirmative vote of the Member Organizations; that the provisions of these Articles with respect to permanent representation to the Administrative Committee and those with respect to the Joint Chairmen until the 1962 meeting shall not be amended without the affirmative votes of the respective Member Organizations concerned; and that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the ownership and custody of the Championship Trophy shall not be amended without the affirmative vote of The United States Golf Association; and provided further, that any amendment of these Articles increasing the monetary obligations of Member Organizations shall not be binding upon any Member Organization which voted against the amendment.

ARTICLE XIV

WOMEN'S AMATEUR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. REGULATIONS. The Council shall conduct biennially a Women's Amateur Team Championship for the Espirito Santo Trophy, open to Teams representing Member Organizations of the Women's Division.

All relevant provisions and principles of Article IV, V, VI, VII and XII shall apply except as follows:

Each Team shall consist of two or three players. In each 18-hole round, the total of the two lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

SECTION 2. PLACE AND TIME. The place and the time of the Women's Amateur Team Championship shall be determined by the Council. The Championship shall be held as near as feasible geographically to the Men's Championship and in an adjacent week or concurrently but preferably before the Men's Championship.

SECTION 3. PRIZES. The Espirito Santo Trophy, presented to the Council by the family of Ricardo Espirito Santo through The Portuguese Golf Federation, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

In the event of abandonment of the Women's Amateur Team Championship, such use or other disposition of the Espirito Santo Trophy shall be made as The Portuguese Golf Federation may in its discretion determine.

ARTICLE XV WOMEN'S DIVISION

All relevant provisions and principles of the Articles shall apply to the Women's Division except as follows:

SECTION 1. MEMBERSHIP. Membership in the Women's Division is open to any organization which either:

(a) Is a Member Organization of the Council and has jurisdiction of women's amateur golf in its country. An application from a Member Organization of the Council for membership in the Women's Division shall be granted automatically.

(b) Constitutes the sole central authority for women's amateur golf in its coun-

try and has adopted the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association. An application from such an organization shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such other data as the Administrative Committee determines. Such an applicant may be elected by the Council after determination by the Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

SECTION 2. FINANCES. Expenses of the Women's Amateur Team Championship as described in Article III, Section 3 shall be shared equally by the Member Organizations of the Women's Division.

SECTION 3. BIENNIAL MEETING. The Women's Division shall meet biennially two days before the start of the Women's Amateur Team Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting each Member Organization of the Women's Division shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be present in person and whose appointment shall be certified to the Secretary in advance.

Eight Member Organizations of the Women's Division represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting.

SECTION 4. WOMEN'S COMMITTEE; CHAIRMAN. There shall be a Women's Committee of nine persons representing nine Member Organizations of the Women's Division, three from each of the three respective Zones. At each Biennial Meeting there shall be chosen by ballot the nine Member Organizations which shall be entitled to appoint representatives to the Women's Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years.

One of these nine Member Organizations shall be chosen by ballot to receive the right to have its representative serve as Chairman of the Women's Division and the Women's Committee.

SECTION 5. DUTIES OF WOMEN'S COMMITTEE. The Women's Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Women's Division, subject to directions of the Council, and shall advise the Council on matters relative to the Women's Amateur Team Championship. Matters of policy shall be determined by the Council.

ARTICLE XVI

SENIOR AMATEUR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. GENERAL. The Council shall conduct a Senior Amateur Team Championship, open to Teams representing the Member Organizations.

Competitors shall be at least 55 years of age on the first day of the Championship.

All relevant provisions and principles of Articles IV, V, VI, VII, and XII shall apply except as follows:

SECTION 2. TIME. The Championship shall be conducted biennially in the autumn in alternate years from the Men's and Women's Championships. Specific dates should be subject to approval of the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 3. PLACE. (a) Each Member Organization will be invited to send a delegate to a meeting to be held during the

Senior Championship to consider invitations to entertain the next Championship. The recommendation of the delegates at this meeting shall be subject to approval of the Administrative Committee.

(b) Invitations to entertain the Senior Championship shall be submitted by Member Organizations to the Secretary at least three months in advance of the meeting of delegates.

SECTION 4. PRIZES. The Shun Nomura Trophy, presented to the Council by friends of golf in Japan through the Japan Golf Association, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

In the event of abandonment of the Senior Amateur Team Championship, such use or other disposition of the Shun Nomura Trophy shall be made as the Japan Golf Association may in its discretion determine.
