# The 1990 Men's Championship



Sweden became the second non-Englishspeaking nation to win the championship, shooting a total score of 879 and finishing 13 strokes ahead of New Zealand and the United States at the Christchurch Golf Club, in Christchurch, New Zealand.

Japan, the 1984 champion, had been the only other non-English-speaking winner.

Sweden led every round, and was never less than seven strokes ahead, its margin over Argentina, Korea, and New Zealand after the first round. The Swedes increased their lead to 14 strokes over Argentina after the second round, and to 16 over the United States after three. Led by a 70 by Mathias Gronberg, 72 by Klas Eriksson, and 73 by Gabriel Hjerstedt, Sweden shot 215 in the first round, and then Gronberg shot 67 in the second, while Hierstedt shot 71.

With Phil Mickelson, its Amateur Champion, opening with two rounds of 78, the United States trailed Sweden throughout the championship. The Americans fell

Sweden cooled off slightly in the third round, when Gronberg slipped to 77 and Eriksson to 78, but Hierstedt's 74 kept them ahead. The Americans made up six strokes, climbing into second place behind Mickelson's 72, 75 by David Eger, and 76 by Allen Doyle. The United States had closed within nine strokes late in the round, but a strong wind blew in from the Pacific Ocean, the Americans lost seven strokes over the last few holes, and never threatened again.

The Americans picked up three more strokes on Sweden in the last round, but they were too far behind to catch up, and were nearly passed by New Zealand. Mickelson, the last American on the course, holed a 40-foot putt on the last green to save a share of second place.

Although neither an award nor official recognition is given the low individual scorer, since this is a team competition, Gronberg shot 70-67-77-72-286, and Hierstedt 73-71-74-74—292, the two lowest

### The 1990 Women's Championship



The United States led every round and won its 11th Women's Championship, with a score of 585 at the Russley Golf Club, in Christchurch, New Zealand. The Americans won by 12 strokes over New Zealand, with 597. Great Britain and Ireland placed third, with 605.

The Americans opened with 148, behind 74s by both Vicki Goetze, who one-putted seven of the first 13 greens, and Pat Hurst, the respective 1989 and 1990 U.S. Women's Amateur Champions. They led by two strokes over Denmark and Germany after 18 holes, by eight strokes over Great Britain and Ireland after 36, and by seven over New Zealand after 54, before pulling away in the last round.

With Miss Hurst shooting 71 and Karen Noble 72, the United States shot a team total of 143, the best of the day by three strokes, and a 36-hole score of 291, eight strokes better than the 299 of Great Britain, built around a second round score of 146 behind 72 by Claire Hourihane and 74 by Vicki Thomas.

A 74 by Mice Coatza and 70 by Mice No.

lead in the third round, but by then New Zealand had climbed into second place. Jan Higgins had shot rounds of 74, 72, and 74 and led the New Zealand climb.

The United States simply overpowered the field in the last round. Both Miss Goetze and Miss Hurst birdied the first two holes, and when New Zealand posted two bogeys, the United States had pulled ahead by 11 strokes. Vicki Goetze finished the round with 67, six strokes under Russley's par of 73, and Miss Hurst added 74, giving the United States 141 for the day, the best team score of the competition (Japan also shot 141 behind 70 by Aki Takamura and 71 by Michiko Hattori).

With Annette Stott shooting 74 and 18-year-old Lisa Aldridge 72, New Zealand had 146 for the day, dropping five strokes to the United States.

Miss Goetze, who had turned 18 during the championship, shot 291 for the 72 holes, matching Miss Higgins, of New Zealand. Although no official recognition is given individual scores, since this is a team competition, their performances, merit, mention

# ARTICLES OF THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL

Revised: October 1990

#### ARTICLE I

The name of this council is THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL.

#### ARTICLE II

Object

# Section 1. Friendship and Sportsmanship through Golf

The object of the Council is to foster friendship and sportsmanship among the peoples of the world through the conduct biennially of an Amateur Team Championship for the Eisenhower Trophy.

#### Section 2. Rules of Golf

The Championship shall be conducted in accordance with the Rules of Golf as approved by The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, and The United States Golf Association; however, if those organizations should have differing codes, the code of the host country shall apply.

#### ARTICLE III

Membership

#### Section 1. Eligibility

Membership in the Council is open to any organization which:

(a) Constitutes the sole central authority for amateur golf in its country; and

(b) Has adopted and administers the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association.

#### Section 2. Election

An application for membership shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such other data as the Administrative Committee determines.

An applicant may be elected to Membership by the Council after determination by the Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

#### Section 3. Finances

(a) Member Organizations shall pay annual dues of \$150, payable in January of each year in the currency of the country in which the Council's Administrative Office is located—see Article IX, Section 8—unless prohibited by law or government regulation. Income from dues shall be used to defray all Council expenses relating to men's events. If expenses in a given year result in a deficit in the Council's account, which shall be maintained in the Administrative Office, the deficit shall be shared by those Member Organizations participating in the men's event held that year.

Expenses of the Council shall be limited to the following:

- Insurance and maintenance of the Championship trophies;
- (2) Provision of prizes for individuals; and
- (3) Cost of stationery, postage, printing and other communications incurred by the Administrative Office.

Income shall be limited to dues and monies accumulated to eliminate a deficit.

No Member Organization may incur any expense for the Council, and no representative of the Council shall have authority to incur any expense except as expressly stated herein.

(b) Any other expense incident to the affairs of the Council shall be borne by the Member Organization whose representative incurs such expense.

(c) The expense of conducting the Championship shall be borne by the Member Organization entertaining it.

#### Section 4. Obligations and Discipline

The acceptance of membership in the Council shall bind each Member Organization to uphold all the provisions of these Articles and any rules or actions of the Council or the Administrative Committee

Any Member Organization failing in these obligations or ceasing to meet the eligibility requirements may be suspended or expelled by the Council.

# Section 5. Correspondence with Member Organizations

A Member Organization shall not circulate a memorandum to all other Member Organizations without approval of the Administrative Committee.

#### Section 6. Withdrawal

Any Member Organization may withdraw from membership by notifying the Administrative Office to that effect.

Any Member Organization so withdrawing shall remain obligated for its annual dues for the year in which withdrawal occurred.

#### ARTICLE IV

Championship

#### Section 1. Time

The Championship shall be held biennially, starting in 1958, on such dates as the Council shall determine. Normally, the Championship shall be held in the second or third week of October.

#### Section 2. Place

(a) The Championship shall be rotated among the three following zones in the order stated:

- Australasian Zone—Countries of Asia, Australia, New Zealand and Oceania.
- (2) American Zone—Countries of North America, the Caribbean and South America.
- (3) European-African Zone—Countries of Europe, Africa and the Middle East.
- (b) Invitations to entertain the Championship shall be submitted by Member Organizations to the Administrative Office at least three months in advance of the Biennial Meeting immediately preceding. The Administrative Office shall inform all Member Organizations of such invitations at least one month in advance of the Meeting.

(Note: Invitations may be submitted by any Member Organization in any zone. Although invitations from the appropriate zone will, of course, be given first consideration, it is important that invitations from other zones, particularly the zone next in order, should be available in case no invitation acceptable to the Council has been received from the appropriate zone.)

At the time of submitting its invitation the Member Organization shall represent that, subject to any restrictions imposed upon it by the Government of its country, it will allow all other Member Organizations to compete if its invitation is accepted. It shall also present with its invitation a statement from a properly authorized official of the Government of its country that all Member Organizations, other than those (if any) named in the statement, will be allowed to visit the country and to compete in the Championship without any restriction whatsoever.

At a time not more than eight months and not less than seven months from the first of the month in which the Championship is to take place, both the Member Organization and a properly authorized official of the Government of its country shall reiterate the statement made in the paragraph above.

Championship invitations shall not be issued and pertinent advertising/promotion shall not be engaged in more than 3½ years in advance.

- (c) The location of each Championship shall normally be determined by the Council at its Biennial Meeting immediately preceding. In reaching its decision the Council shall have regard to:
- (i) The importance of locating the Championship in the appropriate zone in accordance with Section 2(a) of this Article;
- (ii) The desirability of distributing the location of the Championship fairly among the Member Organizations in each zone; and
- (iii) The degree (if any) to which an invitation to entertain the Championship has been restricted by the Government of the country concerned.

If no invitation acceptable to the Council has been received from within the appropriate zone, the Council may consider and accept any invitation

However, if the Council at its Biennial Meeting is unable, due to a lack of acceptable invitations or for any other reason, finally to decide the location of the next Championship, the Administrative Committee shall take such steps as are necessary to ensure the continuance of the Championship.

(d) The Council shall have the power to waive the annual dues of any Member Organization which, owing to a restriction imposed by the Government of the country in which a particular Championship is being held, has not been invited to participate in that Championship.

#### ARTICLE V

Amateur Team Championship

#### Section 1. Entry Dates

Each Member Organization shall inform the Administrative Office biennially as to whether or not it will enter the Championship; such notification shall reach the Administrative Office not later than six months before the Championship. Later entries may be accepted if the Member Organization entertaining the Championship approves.

Each Member Organization which enters the Championship shall inform the Administrative Office of the personnel of its Team not later than one month before the Championship. Substitutions may be made at any subsequent time at the pleasure of the Member Organization.

#### Section 2. Qualification of Players; Amateur Status

The players comprising each Team shall be:

- (a) Amateur golfers under the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews or The United States Golf Association; and
- (b) Citizens of the country of the Member Organization represented, except that in cases where a Team of citizens would be impracticable, players normally resident in the country may be included.

A player with dual nationality who has played for one country in a Championship may, in the immediately following Championship, play for the other country of which he is a citizen, provided he has been a citizen of the other country for at least one year.

Each Team shall have a captain, who may be either a player or a non-player.

#### Section 3. Form of Play

(a) Prior to the date for closing of entries, the Joint Secretaries shall determine the maximum number of Teams which can be accepted at the selected venue. At the date of closing of entries, if the number of Teams entered does not exceed the maximum acceptable number, the Teams will consist of three or four players. If the number of Teams entered exceeds the maximum acceptable, then the Teams will be reduced to two or three players.

If Teams are reduced to two or three players, then the format of the Championship as contained in Article V, Section 3(b) will be amended to reduce (b) The Championship shall consist of 72 holes stroke play; 18 holes each on four consecutive days of the Championship period. All the players of each Team shall be eligible for all four rounds; disqualification of a player under the Rules of Golf in any round shall not be effective for any subsequent round unless the Administrative Committee determines otherwise.

In each 18-hole round, the total of the three lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

The total of the three-player Team scores for the four rounds shall be the Team's score for the Championship.

The Champion shall be the Team with the lowest such total score for 72 holes.

(c) Prior to the start of every Championship, the Administrative Committee shall decide the procedure to be adopted in the event of a tie.

#### Section 4. Prizes

(a) The Eisenhower Trophy, presented to the Council by friends of golf in the United States through The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

(b) A uniform type of prize for individuals shall be awarded to the players and the Captain of the winning Team, the second-place Team and the thirdplace Team.

(c) No other prizes may be accepted from any source, except symbolic gifts by a Member Organization to its Team.

#### Section 5. Championship Committee; Course Unplayable

- (a) Prior to a Championship, the Administrative Committee shall appoint a Championship Committee to conduct the event. The host Member Organization shall be represented on the Championship Committee.
- (b) The Championship Committee shall be authorized to decide when a Championship course is unplayable.
- (c) If a Championship course is declared unplayable and as a result it is not possible to complete 72 holes of play in the period in which the Championship is scheduled, the Championship shall not be extended beyond the last scheduled day and the winner shall be the Team which returns the lowest score for the number of stipulated rounds played, except that, if it is not possible to play at least 36 holes in the four scheduled days, the Championship shall be terminated without a Champion being determined.
- (d) The Championship Committee shall be authorized to schedule in advance a round of less than 18 holes, i.e., the Committee shall be authorized to declare before play begins on any day that the stipulated round for that day shall be, for example, nine holes; the Committee shall not be authorized to declare during play of a round that the stipulated round for that day shall be, for ex-

#### ARTICLE VI

Arrangements for Championship

The Member Organization entertaining the Championship shall have the honor of and be responsible for planning and arranging for the Championship, subject to the applicable provisions of these Articles and approval by the Administrative Committee, and for all the expenses in connection therewith except the expenses of the Teams. Such Member Organization may charge admission to spectators and otherwise raise income as it may desire, and any excess of the proceeds over the expenses shall be disposed of as the Council may determine.

No financial liability shall attach to either the Council or to any Member Organization other than the Member Organization entertaining the Championship.

#### ARTICLE VII

Expenses of Teams

Each Member Organization shall be responsible for the expenses of its Team's players and Captain.

#### ARTICLE VIII

Council Meetings

#### Section 1. Biennial Meeting

The Council shall meet biennially on the day before the start of the Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting of the Council each Member Organization shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization, and who shall be present at the Meeting in person. Appointment of Delegates shall be certified to the Administrative Office in advance.

#### Section 2. Quorum

Ten Member Organizations represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting of the Council.

#### Section 3. Action Without Meeting

Between Biennial Meetings, the Council may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the Member Organizations by the Administrative Office pursuant to direction of the Administrative Committee.

#### Section 4. Majority Decision

A majority vote of the Delegates at a Biennial Meeting of the Council at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the Member Organizations in cases of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Council, subject to any additional requirements of other provisions of these Articles.

#### ARTICLE IX

Administrative Committee

#### Section 1. Composition

There shall be an Administrative Committee of eleven persons representing nine Member Organizations; three Member Organizations in each of the

dent of the country of the Member Organization he represents. If the country entertaining the next Championship is not represented in the Administrative Committee, it shall appoint a twelfth person to serve on the Committee in a non-voting capacity. In addition, the Chairman of the Women's Committee shall serve in a non-voting capacity.

#### Section 2. Nomination; Election

- (a) The Administrative Committee shall serve as a Nominating Committee and shall propose to the Biennial Meeting a slate of Member Organizations to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee. Additional nominations may be made by Delegates to the Biennial Meeting.
- (b) At each Biennial Meeting seven Member Organizations shall be chosen, by ballot, to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years. The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association shall be permanently entitled to appoint two representatives.
- (c) Each Member Organization so chosen shall promptly appoint its representative to the Administrative Committee and give the Administrative Office notification of the appointment. If a Delegate of any Member Organization so chosen is present at the Biennial Meeting, he shall thereupon become the appointee of his Member Organization to the Administrative Committee.
- (d) A Member Organization shall have the right to change its appointee to the Administrative Committee at its pleasure; any such change shall become effective when the Administrative Office receives notification thereof.

#### Section 3. Duties

The Administrative Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Council, subject to the provisions of these Articles and to directions of the Council.

#### Section 4. Meetings

The retiring Administrative Committee shall meet immediately prior to the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

The Administrative Committee newly determined at the Biennial Meeting of the Council shall meet immediately after the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

#### Section 5. Quorum

Three members present in person representing at least three Member Organizations shall constitute a quorum of the Administrative Committee.

#### Section 6. Action Between Meetings

Between meetings, the Administrative Committee may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the representatives to the Administrative Committee by the Administrative Office.

#### Section 7. Majority Decision

A majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the entire Administrative Committee in case of action by mail, shall

Section 8. Administrative Office

The Council's Administrative Office is located at Golf House, Far Hills, N.J., U.S.A. The Administrative Office shall keep the records of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, give notices of all meetings and conduct all votes by mail, carry on the correspondence of the Council, and perform all other customary duties.

#### ARTICLE X

Officers

#### Section 1. Titles; Election

The officers of the Council shall be two Joint Chairmen, who shall be representatives of and appointed by The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, and two Joint Secretaries. The Joint Chairmen shall each be one of the representatives to the Administrative Committee. The Joint Secretaries shall be appointed by the Administrative Committee.

#### Section 2. Chairman

One of the Joint Chairmen shall preside at meetings of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, and in general shall perform the customary duties of his office.

#### ARTICLE XI

Language

The official language of the Council is English.

#### ARTICLE XII

Care of Trophy

#### Section 1. Protection

The United States Golf Association shall retain title to the Championship Trophy, and shall make arrangements for its insurance and for its safekeeping during any suspension of the Championship.

#### Section 2. Dissolution of Council

In the event of dissolution of the Council, such use or other disposition of the Championship Trophy shall be made as The United States Golf Association may in its discretion determine.

#### ARTICLE XIII

#### Amendments

These articles may be amended by action of the Council, provided, however, that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the Rules of Golf and the Rules of Amateur Status shall not be amended without the unanimous affirmative vote of the Member Organizations; that the provisions of these Articles with respect to permanent representation to the Administrative Committee shall not be amended without the affirmative votes of the respective Member Organizations concerned; and that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the ownership and custody of the Championship Trophy shall not be amended without the affirmative vote of The United States Golf Association; and provided further, that any amendment of these Articles increasing the monetary obligations of Member Organizations shall not be binding upon any

#### ARTICLE XIV

Women's Amateur Team Championship

#### Section 1. Regulations

The Council shall conduct biennially a Women's Amateur Team Championship for the Espirito Santo Trophy, open to Teams representing Member Organizations of the Women's Division.

All relevant provisions and principles of Articles IV, V, VI, VII and XII shall apply except as follows:

Each Team shall consist of two or three players. In each 18-hole round, the total of the two lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

#### Section 2. Place and Time

The place and the time of the Women's Amateur Team Championship shall be determined by the Council. The Championship shall be held as near as feasible geographically to the Men's Championship and in an adjacent week or concurrently but preferably before the Men's Championship.

#### Section 3. Prizes

The Espirito Santo Trophy, presented to the Council by the family of Ricardo Espirito Santo through the Portuguese Golf Federation, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

In the event of abandonment of the Women's Amateur Team Championship, such use or other disposition of the Espirito Santo Trophy shall be made as the Portuguese Golf Federation may in its discretion determine.

#### Section 4. Play-Off

If a tie for the Championship occurs, the Teams concerned shall play off immediately hole by hole until the winner is determined. The total of the two lowest scores will be the Team score for each hole.

#### ARTICLE XV

#### Women's Division

All relevant provisions and principles of the Articles shall apply to the Women's Division except as follows:

#### Section 1. Membership

Membership in the Women's Division is open to any organization which either:

(a) Is a Member Organization of the Council and has jurisdiction of women's amateur golf in its country. An application from a Member Organization of the Council for membership in the Women's Division shall be granted automatically.

#### ---OR---

(b) Constitutes the sole central authority for women's amateur golf in its country and has adopted the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association. An application from such an organization shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such data as the Administrative Committee determines. Such an applicant may be elected by the Council after determination by the

Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

#### Section 2. Finances

The principles of Article III, Section 3, shall apply to Women's Division Members to defray all Council expenses relating to women's events.

#### Section 3. Biennial Meeting

The Women's Division shall meet biennially two days before the start of the Women's Amateur Team Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting each Member Organization of the Women's Division shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be present in person and whose appointment shall be certified to the Administrative Office in advance.

Eight Member Organizations of the Women's Division represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting.

#### Section 4. Women's Committee: Chairman

There shall be a Women's Committee of nine persons representing nine Member Organizations of the Women's Division, three from each of the three respective Zones. At each Biennial Meeting there shall be chosen by ballot the nine Member Organizations which shall be entitled to appoint representatives to the Women's Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years.

One of these nine Member Organizations shall be chosen by ballot to receive the right to have its representative serve as Chairman of the Women's Division and the Women's Committee.

#### Section 5. Duties of Women's Committee

The Women's Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Women's Division, subject to directions of the Council, and shall advise the Council on matters relative to the Women's Amateur Team Championship. Matters of policy shall be determined by the Council.

#### ARTICLE XVI

Senior Amateur Team Championship

#### Section 1. General

The Council may conduct a Senior Amateur Team Championship, open to Teams representing the Member Organizations.

Competitors shall be at least 55 years of age on the first day of the Championship.

All relevant provisions and principles of Articles IV, V, VI, VII and XII shall apply except as follows.

#### Section 2. Time

The Championship shall be conducted biennially in the Autumn, in alternate years from the Men's and Women's Championships. Specific dates should be subject to approval of the Administrative Committee.

#### Section 3. Place

(a) Each Member Organization will be invited to send a Delegate to a meeting to be held during the Senior Championship to consider invitations to entertain the next Senior Championship. The recommendation of the Delegates of this meeting shall be

subject to approval of the Administrative Committee.

(b) Invitations to entertain the Senior Championship shall be submitted by Member Organizations to the Administrative Office at least three months in advance of the meeting of Delegates.

#### Section 4. Form of Play

- (a) Each Team shall consist of four players.
- (b) The Championship shall consist of a 36-hole stroke play qualifying competition over two days, 18 holes on the first Championship day and 18 holes on the second Championship day, followed by two rounds of match play over two days in flights of 4.
- (c) In each 18-hole qualifying round, the total of the three lowest scores by players of a Team shall constitute the Team's score for that round. The total of a Team's three-player scores for the two rounds shall be the Team's qualifying score.
- (d) Teams shall be placed in flights for match play according to qualifying scores, with the four lowest-scoring Teams comprising the Championship Flight, the Teams in positions 5 through 8 comprising the Second Flight, and so on.
- (e) In event of a tie for last place in the Championship Flight, there shall be a sudden-death playoff among all players of the tied Teams, with the three lowest scores by players of a Team constituting the Team's score for a hole. A tie for last place in any other flight shall be decided by lot.
- (f) In each flight, Teams shall be numbered 1 through 4 based on qualifying scores. In event of a tie, Team numbers shall be decided by lot. In the first round of match play Team No. 1 shall play Team No. 3 and Team No. 2 shall play Team No. 4. In the second round of match play, the first-round winners shall play for the first place and the first-round losers shall play for third place. Prizes shall be awarded to each member of the first, second and third place Teams in each flight.
- (g) The winner of a match shall be determined as follows: Prior to each match, each Team Captain shall present to the Committee by a specified time his Team's line-up, i.e., a list of his players numbered 1 through 4. The No. 1 players of two opposing Teams shall play an 18-hole match for one point, the No. 2 players shall play for a point, and so on. In event of a tied match, each player shall be awarded ½ point. The Team with the most points shall be the winner.
- (h) In event of a tie between two opposing Teams in the Championship Flight, there shall be a suddendeath play-off among all players of both Teams, i.e., the first Team "up" after a hole shall be the winner. For example, if the No. 1 player of Team A wins the first extra hole from the No. 1 player of Team B, the No. 2 player of Team B, wins the first

extra hole from the No. 2 player of Team A, the No. 3 player of Team A wins the first extra hole from the No. 3 player of Team B and the No. 4 players of the two Teams halve the first extra hole, Team A would be the winner. Ties in other flights shall be decided on a margin-of-victory basis. If the opposing Teams are also tied on a margin-of-victory basis, there shall be a sudden-death play-off as in the Championship Flight. The winner on a marginof-victory basis is the Team with the highest figure when the margin-of-victory figures of its winning players are totaled. For example, if players No. 1 and 3 of Team A win by 4-2 and 2-1 and players No. 2 and 4 of Team B win by 3-2 and 2-1, Team A would be the winner as the total of its marginof-victory figures is 9(4+2+2+1) compared with 8(3+2+2+1) for Team B.

- (i) All matches in a given flight will tee off in immediate succession. If necessary, play shall be in groups of four, i.e., the No. 1 players of two opposing Teams would play their match concurrently with the No. 2 players of the same Teams. They would be followed immediately by the No. 3 and 4 players of the same Teams.
- (j) If the total number of Teams entered is divisible by 4, each flight shall comprise four Teams. If the total is not divisible by 4, the following schedule will be used. In flights of less than four Teams bye(s) shall be used for the last place(s):

#### Section 5. Prizes

The Shun Nomura Trophy, presented to the Council by friends of golf in Japan through the Japan Golf Association, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

In the event of abandonment of the Senior Amateur Team Championship, such use or other disposition of the Shun Nomura Trophy shall be made as the Japan Golf Association may in its discretion determine.
