Korea Wins the 2012 Women's Championship

The Republic of Korea, with a total of 13-under-par 563, won the 2012 Women's World Amateur Team Championship (WWATC) at Gloria Golf Club in Antalya, Turkey, by three strokes, becoming the first team in 22 years to capture consecutive titles.

"We were struggling yesterday and we had a long conversation last night," said Korean coach Hyung-Mo Kang. "The beginning did not go so well, but they ramped it up at the end. I am very happy."

The last team to win in consecutive Espirito Santo Trophy competitions was the USA in 1988 and 1990. Korea won the 2010 WWATC in Argentina with a record-setting score of 546.

The 2012 championship was its third gold medal as it took the title in 1996 as well.

Korea withstood a 7-under-par charge from Germany, which took the silver medal at 566. Finland, which also shot seven under for the day, shared the bronze medal with Australia at 567.

It is Germany's second medal all-time and first since tying for silver in 1998. Finland won its first medal in the competition and Australia took its first medal since winning gold in 2002.

"We play them annually at the Queen Sikirit Cup and every year we are chasing them," New Zealand captain Libby Steele said of the Korean Team. "They have fresh players every time and they just keep producing good golfers. It shows when you see them on all the Tours around the world."

Korea posted a 2-under-par 70 on Gloria's New Course from Kyu-Jung Baek and an even-par 72 from Hyo-Joo Kim, No. 3 in the Women's World Amateur Golf Ranking (WWAGR). Min-Sun Kim shot a non-counting 74. Young-Min Park was the captain of the winning team.

"Last night, we tried to forget about our score, forget about how many shots we were

leading by and who was trying to catch us," Baek said. "We just tried to focus on playing well."

Spain and New Zealand tied for fifth at 568. The rest of the top 10 included: Canada in seventh at 569, the USA in eighth at 570, France in ninth at 572 and Japan in 10th at 574.

Although there is no prize awarded,

Lydia Ko, 15, of New Zealand, No.1 in the WWAGR, set a championship mark for lowest individual score at 14-under-par 274. Ko, the reigning U.S. Women's Amateur champion and winner of the LPGA Tour's Canadian Open, broke the mark set in 2010 by Korea's Jung-Eun Han at 275.

Sweden's record of 24 consecutive Espirito Santo Trophy competitions with a place in the top 10 ended as the team tied for 13th.

The host team from Turkey finished tied for 36th.

The upper half of the draw played at Gloria Golf Club's New Course in the fourth round and the lower half played the Old Course.

The 2012 championship was hosted by the Turkish Golf Federation.

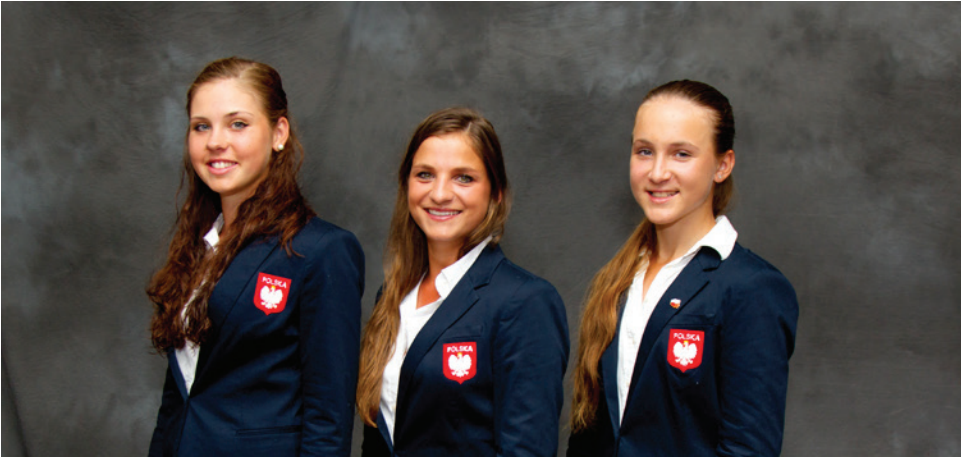

USA Wins the 2012 Men's Championship

With a record-setting score of 24-under-par 404, the USA won the weather-shortened 2012 World Amateur Team Championship (WATC) by five strokes over Mexico at the par-71 Antalya Golf Club and claimed the Eisenhower Trophy for the 14th time in Antalya, Turkey.

Steven Fox, of Hendersonville, Tennessee, the 2012 U.S. Amateur champion and Chris Williams, of Moscow, Idaho, No. 1 in the World Amateur Golf Ranking (WAGR), both shot 2-under 69 for the USA. Justin Thomas, of Goshen, Kentucky, posted a non-counting 1-under 70.



"It has been since 2004 that the trophy has found its way to the USA and it is great to have it coming back to our shores," said USA captain Jim Vernon, a past USGA president. "They are three guys who bonded well and played golf as a team."

The previous low total for 54 holes was 407 by the USA in Puerto Rico in the 2004 WATC, which was also played at 54 holes because of weather.

"It's fun to win as an individual," said Williams, a University of Washington senior who won the 2012 Western Amateur. "But to win as a team is awesome and it doesn't get any better than doing it as a representative of the USA."

Despite a strong challenge from Mexico, which finished second at 19-under 409 and was led by Sebastian Vazquez's individual low total of 15-under 199, the USA led from the start to the finish, setting records along the way.

In winning their 24th medal in the 28 Eisenhower Trophy competitions, the Americans broke team marks for lowest 18-, 36- and 54-hole scores, which were all set in 2004 in Puerto Rico.

Previously, the low 18-hole score was 132, the 36-hole score was 268 and the 54-hole score was 407.

"I would go back to the first round where Chris shot 64 and Justin shot 67 and we were 13 under," said Fox of the team's first round, played at Cornelia Golf Club. "We just built from there."

All three American players finished in the top 10 individually. Williams was second at 14-under 200, Thomas was

tied for seventh at 7-under 207 and Fox was tied for 10th at 6-under 208. The highest score shot by the USA was a non-counting 1-under 71 by Fox in the first round.

The Mexican Team, playing in its 26th WATC, won its first medal.

"We had good expectations this week but this is a dream come true," said Mexican captain Jorge Coghlan. "I played in this a long time ago [1986] and being captain is very satisfying.

"This is Sebastian's last amateur tournament and there is no better way to go out than winning the World Amateur. He is going to be a heck of a professional."

Four strokes behind Mexico at 15-under-par 413 as three-way bronze medalists were defending champion France, Germany and the Republic of Korea. Along with Mexico, Germany and the Republic of Korea won their first medals in the Eisenhower competition.

Canada and Norway tied for sixth at 417, with England in eighth at 418, and Japan, Venezuela and Spain tied for ninth at 419.

Turkey, the host team, finished 36th.

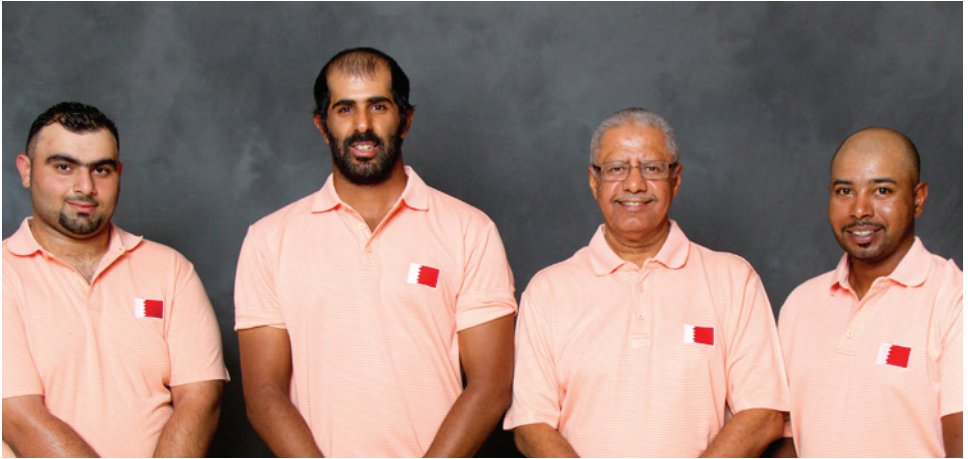

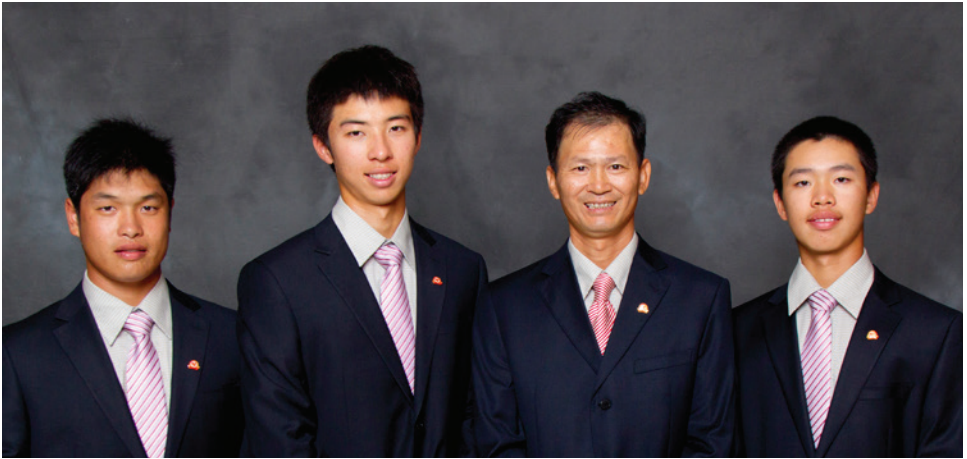

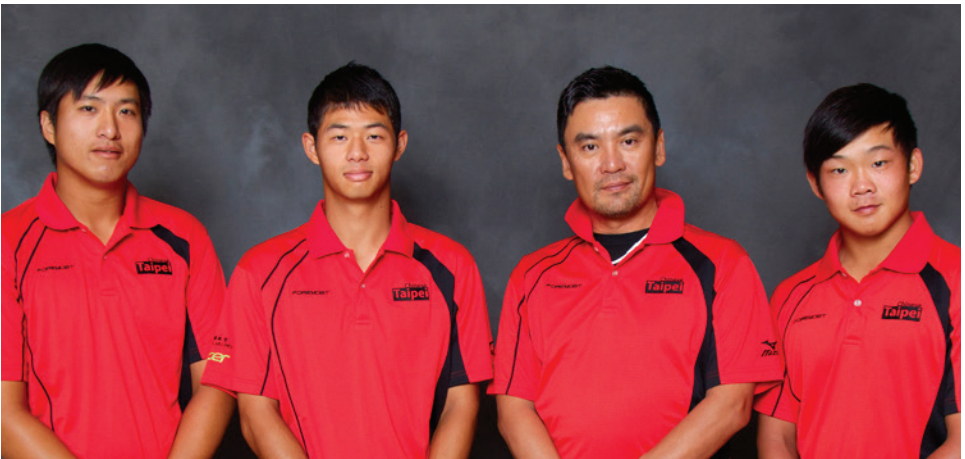

HISTORY OF THE INTERNATIONAL GOLF FEDERATION

Dilemma, but a good one:

By the 1950s, the United States Golf Association (USGA) has received too many invitations for international matches against individual countries to be able to accept them all.

January, 1958:

The USGA Executive Committee, discussing yet another of these generous invitations – this time from Japan – proposes the establishment of an international team competition so that all countries can participate in these types of events.

March, 1958:

Representatives from the USGA travel to Scotland to discuss the idea with representatives of The Royal & Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland (The R&A). The concept is enthusiastically received.

May, 1958:

Representatives from 35 countries meet in Washington, D.C., USA, hosted by the USGA and The R&A, to establish the World Amateur Golf Council (WAGC), so that it may conduct the World Amateur Team Championship. The meeting is arranged through cooperation with Pan American Airlines and the U.S. Department of State, and the trips of all attendees are funded by an anonymous group, the Friends of American Golf. President Dwight D. Eisenhower welcomes the group in the White House Rose Garden. The Council is begun with 32 Member Organizations and governing Articles are established.

October, 1958:

The first championship is hosted by The R&A on the Old Course at St. Andrews, Scotland. The Australian team defeats the American team in an 18-hole play-off by two strokes. Bob Jones is the Captain of the USA team.

September, 1960:

The second championship is hosted by the USGA at Merion Golf Club (East Course) in Ardmore, Pennsylvania. Although the original 1958 Delegates envisioned that the championship would be match play by this year, it has remained at stroke play through the present day. Jack Nicklaus's 72-hole record of 269 at Merion GC still stands today.

1964:

The French Golf Federation proposes that the USA Curtis Cup Team stop in France for an informal match following the Curtis Cup Match in Wales. The USGA accepts the invitation but also suggests inviting other nations to create a women's counterpart to the World Amateur Team Championship. The French are delighted to do so.

Vicomtesse de Saint Sauveur (known to many as Lally Segard), of France, and Mrs. Henri Prunaret, of the United States, planned the championship.

October, 1964:

The French Golf Federation holds the first Women's World Amateur Team Championship. Twenty-five teams compete. France beats the USA by one stroke.

With sincere thanks to France, it is unanimously agreed that the World Amateur Golf Council will hereafter conduct the women's event.

1991:

The World Amateur Golf Council becomes affiliated with the International Olympic Committee as its recognized International Federation for golf.

2009:

The IOC votes to return golf to the 2016 and 2020 Olympic Games Programmes.

2011:

The IGF adopts a new constitution that opens membership to all international golf organizations, and establishes a new office in Lausanne, Switzerland.

THE TROPHIES



Espirito Santo

The Trophy once belonged to the Tsar of Russia, Nicolas II. It is rumored to once have been gold-plated. After the Russian Revolution of 1917 the precious belongings of the Royal Family were scattered in auction sales and Ricardo and Silvia Espirito Santo of Portugal bought the Trophy. The original intention was for a Portuguese International event, but as it was only played once or twice the Trophy then had no destination. Vicomtesse de Saint Sauveur, the co-founder of the Women's World Amateur Team Championship in 1964, contacted the Espirito Santos when she heard the Trophy might be available. They were thrilled to offer the Trophy, through the Portuguese Golf Federation, for the inaugural event in France.

Eisenhower

With the blessing of Dwight D. Eisenhower, 34th President of the United States of America, the World Amateur Team Championship is played for the Eisenhower Trophy. It is inscribed, "To foster friendship and sportsmanship among the Peoples of the World," the IGF's guiding principle. The trophy was presented, via the United States Golf Association and The Royal & Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland (now The R&A), by the Friends of American Golf for the inaugural World Amateur Team Championship played on the Old Course in St. Andrews in 1958.
